LATE NEWS SUMERIZED.
State, General and Foreign News Condensed for the Perusal of the Busy Reader.

Heavy rains occurring for the last few days throughout the Middle West threaten to absolutely ruin the crops.

Portland sawmills have advanced rough lumber \$1.50 per thousand and the first-class, clear product \$2.00, taking effect today.

An Eastern trade journal refers to the Morning Oregonian of Olympia, Or. Some of these eastern papers are terrifically ignorant.

Gerald R. Campbell, who was shot by mistake for Tracy, was insane. His mother has retained his body and taken it to Black River Falls, his former home.

The Secretary of the Navy announces that the four new battleships authorized by Congress will be named the Washington, the Tennessee, the Louisiana and the Connecticut.

Passengers who came down on a recent Steamerport Klondike metropolis full of idle men, who went in expecting to secure work on the new Klondike creek railway.

The appropriation of \$22,000 for public surveys in Oregon has been exhausted. That much more could be profitably expended, as there is great demand for public lands, both for homes and timber.

The Southern Pacific has put into effect summer excursion rates effective July 1, to Boswell Springs, 105 miles south of Portland on its line. These springs are justly noted for their medicinal qualities and Boswell Springs have other claims as a delightful summer resort.

The town of Gold Hill is to be lighted by electricity by July 15th. The machinery for the plant to be installed there by J. J. Honck has been shipped and will soon arrive and the poles for stringing the wires on are on the ground.

A recent tragedy at Pearl Idaho, was of a sensational order. Here is the story. Twelve years ago W. T. Kissinger, a Lane county man married Hattie Horn. They moved to Umatilla county and then to Idaho, where a sister of his wife, Miss Ada Horn reside with them. He fell desperately in love with her, which was reciprocated, and she agreed to marry him if he secured a divorce, which he did. He came back to Lane county on a visit, and while there heard that Ada Horn had married a man named Garner. He got his gun and started for Pearl Idaho, where he murdered his sister-in-law and then shot himself.

Secretary of state Dunbar has issued list of the members of the Twenty-second Legislative Assembly of Oregon. The Senate consists of 21 Republicans, 3 Democrats, 3 Citizens, 1 Union, 1 Citizens-Democratic-People-Union 1 Democratic-People's. The strength of the Republicans in the Senate, however is in reality 24, since the three citizens Senators from Multnomah county voted with the Republicans two years ago, he three fusion hold over members always affiliated with the Democrats, whose strength is really six in the Senate. The membership of the House is established on strict party lines, with the exception of one member-Representative John Hahn, of Clatsop county, elected as a citizen. Mr. Hahn was a member of the House two years ago, when he voted with the Republicans on Senator. Omitting him from the calculation, the complexion of the House membership is Republican 48, Democrats 11.

LATEST NEWS.

Hanging at St. Helens--King Edward Improving--Not Nora Fuller's Murderer.

ST. HELENS, Ore., July 2.--"So long, Joe," "So long Leopold!" Such were the cheery salutes in a tremulous voice sung out before 200 spectators by August Schieve, as the black cap was adjusted over his head at a few minutes after noon today, and he was swung from the scaffold. With almost his last words protesting his innocence, Murderer Schieve mounted the scaffold at 12 o'clock. It was expected that he would make a clean breast of the whole affair, as he had promised. He made a short speech, and was pronounced dead at 12:05 by Dr. H. R. Cliff and Dr. McLaren, the latter of Ranier. The murderer's neck was broken by the fall. Schieve was hanged for the cold blooded murder of Joe Schulkowski at St. Helen's a year ago last Christmas whom he killed for his money.

KING EDWARDS CONDITION.

LONDON, July 2.--At Buckingham Palace the following bulletin was issued at 10 o'clock this morning, on the condition of King Edward:

"The King had another excellent night, and is making steady progress in all respects. The wound is much less troublesome and is beginning to heal.

LONDON, July 2.--The following was issued from Buckingham Palace at 7 P. M.: "The King maintains his steady progress. The local pain being less, the days are passed with greater comfort.

FLAX, NOT BENNETT.

PORTLAND, July 1.--John Flax, the man who, at Sedro-Woolley, Wash., said he was John Bennett, wanted in San Francisco for the murder of Nora Fuller, is free and laughing in his sleeve.

"This Bennett," as he styled himself, was formerly a cigar maker in Astoria, and his true name is John Flax. He had been on a big spree, and spent about \$500. When he reached Sedro-Woolley, being without money, and knowing he would go crazy unless cared for, he took the first method that came into his head to get locked up. This he accomplished by declaring while in a saloon that he was the murderer of Nora Fuller. The saloon-keeper instantly placed him under arrest, and sent for the Marshal.

"Flax had been reading everything he could get hold of regarding the Fuller case, and played his part to perfection.

BAD BOY ALFONSO.

MADRID, July 1.--Since the coronation of King Alfonso the quarrels between him and the Dowager Queen Marie, his mother, have been so frequent and violent that they have become a veritable scandal. Her slightest effort to guide the monarch has resulted in a tirade of stable boy profanity. Recently, in the presence of servants, the young King informed his mother that he would expel her from the palace if she did not respect his wishes. Alfonso's manners have been generally insufferable since his coronation.

FIRST SHOOTING DURING THE STRIKE.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 1.--The first loss of life during the anthracite strike occurred today at the William A colliery at Duryea. Antonio Guiseppe, an Italian, was shot dead by one of the coal and iron policemen from behind the stockade of the colliery. Reports differ as to the cause of the shooting. The friends of the dead man say he was walking on the road near the stockade when he was fired upon, and was on his way from Scranton to Duryea. Another report is that the Italians tried to get over the fence and would not heed the warning of the policemen to go away. There is much indignation and the Sheriff of Lackawanna county was summoned to take steps to preserve order, as it was reported that there would be an uprising among the foreigners and that they would attack the stockade before night.

AVENGED HIS FATHER'S DEATH.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., July 1.--"There's the man who killed my father." As Ray Smith, 21, uttered these words he fired twice at Judge David Rogers, who was entering the dining room of Smith's Hotel at Maynard, Union county. Judge Rogers fell dead, pierced by two bullets. The tragedy was the sequel of a murder which occurred in this city July 16, 1896, when Judge Rogers killed G. W. Smith, father of Ray, in a pistol duel in a saloon. The boy swore to avenge his father's death with the life of his slayer, and did so. He escaped and is at large.

POSSES AFTER CONVICTS.

TACOMA, July 1.--Sheriff John Hartman, of Pierce county, left Tacoma this morning to join in the hunt for Tracey and Merrill. He took one or two men with him. The report that the convicts had again been bottled up in the woods near Tenino proves to be without foundation. If the desperadoes were there they have again succeeded in giving their pursuers the slip, and the trail must be sought again. Deputy Sheriff Webb, at Wilkeson, and officers in other towns of Pierce county have been reinforced and are guarding public highways and bridges.

THE VOTE ON GOVERNOR.

While the vote for Governor will not be canvassed officially and finally until the regular session of the legislature in January, the official returns by counties have been unofficially totaled and the plurality for Chamberlain is 29%.

The vote on the two leading candidates was: Geo. E. Chamberlain, d. 39,862; Wm. J. Furnish, r. 29,606.

Furnish carried 21 out of the 32 counties in the state. The twelve counties carried by Chamberlain are Baker, Douglas, Jackson, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Umatilla, Union and Wallowa.
