**DEALT WITH INSURGENT.**  
**The Troubles of C. B. Perkins Become More Numerous and More Serious.**

PORTLAND, July 7.—Editor PLAINDEALER.—C. B. Perkins, who posed as the injured one in "The Society Event" that sadly miscarried" which appeared in the Plaindealer sometime ago seems to be having a serious time between black-mailing an innocent woman and furnishing ammunition to the Insurgents. He evidently finds a more relentless foe in the U. S. Government than a helpless woman.

Perkins' record in his native state is far from an enviable one as in 1894 he was indicted for larceny of a cow and was tried, but not convicted as the Lane County Court records show.

Then a short time afterwards he was in the toils again, this time with the S. P. K. R. for stealing tickets at Grants Pass, but through the influence of friends came clear of the charge.

Perkins then went to the Navy Yard at Mare's Island and enlisted on the U. S. S. Monadnock and while on board his one ruling passion had him serving out more than one sentence. After his time expired in the Navy he was appointed clerk in the Navy Yard at Cavite where he became enamoured of a Filipino washer woman which cost him a good deal of hush money.

Then through the influence of a cousin, an influential politician of California he was appointed Post Master at Calamba, but the money was not coming as fast as his expensive and fast living demanded so he engaged in the Cantoner or Liqueur Business on his own responsibility, which ended about May 1st 1902, with his arrest for Embezzlement, by the Pacific Oriental Trading Company, brought about by the military authorities confiscating the entire Cantoner stock on the grounds that Perkins furnished the Insurgents of Laguna and Cavite Provinces with Arms and Ammunitions, which to say the least is a serious charge.

**DIVORCE WANTED.**  
**By Woman Who Found She Had Married a Woman.**

BALTIMORE, Md., July 7.—Mrs. Ernestine L. Rank has sought the aid of the courts in order to annul her marriage to Lydia Lotta Sawyer, alias Herman G. Wood, whose masquerade as a man has been reported. Mrs. Rank, by Attorney James A. McCarthy, filed a petition in the Supreme Court, asking that her "Colorable and feigned marriage" be declared null and void, and upon the petition Judge Wright signed an order for a hearing of the case.

**Oregon and Other State News.**

The supreme court has decided that the barber's Sunday closing law is valid. Surveying has commenced on the proposed new railroad from Grants Pass to the coast at Crescent City.

Walter Lyon, private secretary to Governor Geer, and Guard Carson of the Walla Walla penitentiary, are going to try again to follow Tracy with the bounds.

La Grande—William Hill, an ex-convict, arrested for larceny, was shot by Constable Childers Saturday while attempting to forcibly resist the effort to imprison him. He died Tuesday.

The Cheyenne Indians near Calumet, O. T., are reported holding a war council, being angry over an order of the Indian agent prohibiting them from practicing the tortures incident to their sun dance.

The surveyors for the Salt Lake Coos Bay railroad now have a wire set and tacks driven from Empire City nearly into Marsfield. They have also run a trial survey into North Bend.—Marsfield Mail.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the sub-committee on the location of the Lewis & Clarke fair site at Portland reported in favor of the City Park, with Hawthorn Park as second choice.

O. C. Applegate has been recommended for re-appointment as Indian agent at Fort Klamath by Senator Mitchell and Representative Toungie. They have also recommended W. F. Arant of Klamath county to be superintendent of Crater Lake National Park.

A Springfield, Mo., citizen was willed \$12,000 provided he would change his name from Holmes to Frisbie and was given until July 3, 1902, to accept the new name and get his money. Holmes proved there is something in a name after all by declining to make the change. Some people have been known to change their names without a money consideration.

**GOULDS AND COOS BAY.**

CHICAGO, July 7.—Renewed activity in completing the surveys of the proposed line of railroad to Coos Bay, with an extension probably to Portland, Or., and the acquisition of options on properties at the former place that will be very valuable only in the event of the completion of the road, have started speculation as to the interest behind the proposed line. It is being pointed out that the railroad situation west of the Rocky Mountains favors the supposition that the Gould interest would profit most largely by the construction of a new line from Salt Lake to Coos Bay, and the Eastern Oregon country. Such a line would give the Goulds a route through to the Coast.

**Tracy's Latest Movements. He has Confederates. Proves Himself a Romancer.**

**TRACEY LINGERS IN AND AROUND SEATTLE.**

SEATTLE, July 8.—Tracey, this afternoon, called at a farmhouse 1 1/2 miles east of Renton and 10 miles southeast of Seattle. The news was brought to the city at 2 o'clock by Charles Jerry, who lives at the place indicated. Tracey and Anderson came to Jerry's house shortly after noon and gave him two of the watches which they had previously taken from others, and told him to go out and dispose of them. Instead of doing this, Jerry went at once to Renton and telephoned the news to the sheriff's office. Posses were at once organized in the vicinity, and it is thought that Tracey is again surrounded.

A posse has left for the scene. They will go to Renton on the street car and make their way to Jerry's house as rapidly as possible. They should arrive there before 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Some time between Saturday night and Monday night Tracey reached the city of Seattle. The Johnson boat, in which he left Port Madison, accompanied by the man Anderson, Saturday night, at 6 o'clock, was found today at noon with a chain attached to the bow thrown over a boom of logs at the wharf at Newell's Mill, on Seventh avenue, south, in South Seattle. The boat was seen there last night, but no attention was paid to it at that time. Today at noon one of the mill employes noticed for the first time that the boat answered in every way the description of the Johnson boat. Mr. Newell, owner of the mill, immediately telephoned to police headquarters and Detective Adams and Officer Bevan left for the mill at once. There, a further examination of the boat was made, and it was ascertained beyond any doubt to be the Johnson boat.

A rapid investigation in the neighborhood revealed the fact that two men were seen leaving the Newell Wharf late yesterday afternoon. One of them was armed. It is believed that these two men are Tracey and Anderson.

**TRACEY HAS CONFEDERATES.**

ORILLIA, Wash., July 9 (12 o'clock M.)—It is now known definitely that Merrill is with Tracey. He joined him last night in the vicinity of Renton, and is traveling with him this morning. They were both together at the Hart house on the Squire farm as late as 8 o'clock this morning. Merrill has been positively identified by a man from the Salem Penitentiary. It has been learned that Anderson's story regarding the four men whom Tracey met on Monday is absolutely correct. Merrill is one of the four men.

**READS LIKE A ROMANCE.**

SEATTLE, July 9.—Nothing that Jesse James ever did in the way of daring and audacity could equal the calmness and chivalry of the now famous outlaw, Tracey, while at the Gerald home near Seattle Wednesday morning. Meeting the three ladies of the house in a blackberry patch near by, he made himself known, assuring the ladies that he would do them no harm. He joked with them and gallantly proposed to accompany them to the house, started a fire in the stove, carried water from the spring, danced a little 4 year old child on his knee and made friends with her while he witnessed the posse forming around the house he related anecdotes of his experience to the ladies and proved himself a charming conversationalist. When a news paper reporter passed near the door he remarked, "There goes the posse's advance agent. I am fleeing from the reporters who want to interview me and not from the guards." When the guards began to close in, the little child crept to Tracey's side for protection, and the man who had slain half a dozen men, assured the ladies that he would protect them. After dining, Tracey presented each of the ladies with valuable jewelry as a gift, and bidding them a courteous farewell, crept out of the back door and easily made his escape through the line of guards.

**OKLAHOMA VOLCANIC DISTURBANCE.**

GUTHRIE, O. T., July 8.—Great excitement has been caused at Tulsa I. T., owing to the discovery by surveyors working north of that place of cracks in the sides of the mounds, as though from great pressure underneath. Gas is escaping from the fissures, and a continual hissing and roaring can be heard. On the extreme top of the highest hill there has been a small volcano at work, raising large boulders and tossing them aside. Experts state it is a great oil and gas field, and that pressure from a great depth has caused the commotion. Inhabitants of Tulsa are becoming nervous over the state of affairs.

**JESSIE MORRISON SENTENCED.**  
 She Must Serve 2 1/2 Years in Prison for the Murder of Mrs. Olin Castle.

EDWARDS, Calif., July 8.—Jessie Morrison, who was convicted June 28th of murder in the second degree for killing Mrs. Olin Castle at the latter's home here in January, 1900, by cutting her throat with a razor, was today sentenced to 2 1/2 years in the penitentiary. Motion for a new trial was overruled. Miss Morrison, who has gone through three trials, took the sentence with little show of demonstration. The case will be appealed to the State Supreme Court. At her second trial, Miss Morrison was given but five years.

After receiving sentence, Miss Morrison said: "The Judge has been against me from the first, and was bound to convict me. I expected no mercy from him and did not get any. I don't consider I had a fair trial, and believe the Supreme Court will again reverse the case."

The appeal to the Supreme Court will not act as a stay, and Miss Morrison will be taken to the penitentiary at an early date.

**THE VETERANS' TURN.**  
 Indian War Pension Blanks Will Be Out This Week.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Pension Commissioner Ware will this week issue blanks upon which Indian War veterans and their survivors, according to the recently enacted law, will make application for pensions. These blanks may be had on application to the department or from the members of the Oregon Congressional delegation. Each blank carries with it full instructions as to the course to be pursued, instructions being so explicit, both as to the evidence required and the manner in which claims shall be filed, that it will not be necessary for the pensioner to employ an attorney. If any claim is held up, no one better than a Senator or Representative can have the difficulty adjusted, for they have a standing and priority before the department that is not accorded attorneys. In fact, the attorneys are utterly without authority.

**Game Law--Deer.**

Section 2. It shall be unlawful at any time to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, or to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange any spotted fawn.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful at any time between the first day of November of each year and the 15th day of July of the following year to hunt, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, or to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange any buck deer, antelope, moose or mountain sheep. It shall be unlawful at any time between the first day of November of each year and the 15th day of August of the following year to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, or to sell or offer for sale, barter, or exchange any female deer, provided that the foregoing part of this section shall not apply to the counties of Grant, Harney, Malheur and Baker, and in said counties it shall be unlawful at any time between the 15th day of October of each year, and the first day of October of the following year to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, or to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange any deer or antelope whatever. And it shall be unlawful at any time within the state of Oregon, between one hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise of any day of any year, to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure or destroy any deer, antelope, moose or mountain sheep, and it shall be unlawful at any time to hunt or pursue any deer, antelope or moose with dog or dogs, with intention to kill or injure such deer, antelope or moose; and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, capture, kill or destroy in any open season more than five deer.
