ROSEBURG SUICIDES.

D. P. Prichard, Jeweler, Shoots Himself at Grants Pass.

Word came from Grants Pass early this morning that D. P. Prichard, the old pioneer jeweler of Roseburg, had committed suicide at C. E. Smith's hotel in that city Sunday night by shooting himself with a revolver. While still alive at noon today, the wound is pronounced fatal and death may result at any time. The ball entered the left breast and penetrated to the region of the heart. Prichard informed the Grants Pass officers that he desired to make a statement to the I. O. O. F. lodge of Roseburg, of which he was a member, but by the time the officers of the lodge here reached the telephone office it was announced that the old gentleman was too weak to make a statement, further than to request that after his death his remains be shipped to Roseburg to be interred by the side of those of his wife who died here many years ago.

He was always of a jovial, genial disposition, not given in the least to despondency and no reason can be ascribed for his rash act.

On leaving this city he informed friends that he was going to Grants Pass a brief business visit. He also requested Geo. Rapp, who conducts a grocery store next door to Prichard's jewelry store to collect all work that was brought to his store in his absence and tell his patrons the work would be executed on his return Monday.

Portland Tragedy.

PORTLAND, July 12.—A. L. Belding, a bartender, shot and killed his wife, mother-in-law and a man whom he suspected of having alienated his wife's affections, and wounded his father-in-law, Lemuel McCroskey, at the latter's residence, northeast corner of Fifth and Flinders streets, last night. The shooting was done in execution of a pre-meditated plan to wipe out the McCroskey household, and the only regret offered by the murderer in his cell today is that three of those whom he had marked for his victims escaped.
