LATE NEWS SUMERIZED.

State, General and Foreign News Condensed for the Perusal of the Busy Reader.

Parto Rico has 800 new school houses.

A native of Cuba has invented a horse-shoe that has no nails.

The 1894 half dollar is very rare and cannot be procured for less than \$200.

It takes about three seconds for a message to go from one end of the Atlantic cable to the other.

Seattle's exports to Japan are now about \$5,000,000 per annum, which is 11 times what they were six years ago.

Oregon produced about 10,500,000 pounds of wool this year, and nearly all of it has been disposed of at prices between 12 and 14 cents.

In 1870 the cost of shipping grain from Chicago to New York was \$1.10 per 100 pounds. During this year the rate has been as low as 11 cents.

Commodore Joseph E. Montgomery the veteran confederate commander who, during the civil war, almost succeeded in capturing General Grant, died Monday at the home of his son at Chicago.

The Bohemia Nugget is just installing a new Campbell cylinder water power news press at Cottage Grove and the office is being likewise improving. The Nugget deserves the prosperity it is enjoying.

Horses from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, British Columbia, California, Utah, Colorado, Montana and Canada are entered to race at the State Fair this fall—and it will be the greatest racing event on the circuit.

Mrs. Herbert Haskett and her infant child, which she was wheeling in a baby buggy, were instantly killed by an Illinois Central train at Cedar Falls, Ia. They were returning from the funeral of a child who had been killed in the same way on the same spot the day before.

The first Josephine County water-melons of the season were brought into Grant's Pass Tuesday by the wagon load, and all the local stores were supplied. The season will be on in full force in another week, and shipping will begin to distant points. This season's crop will be above that of any past year, both for quantity and quality.

Forest Fire in Josephine

GRANT'S PASS, Aug. 5.—As is usual each summer season, forest fires have again broken out in the Josephine County mountains and much damage is being done the fir and pine timber. Several fires have been burning during the past three days in the forests of Lanes Creek district, a few miles north of Grant's Pass. The fire has burned across the divide and is now working its way into the Jones Creek district, toward the Dry Diablos, near this city. All day yesterday and the day before the fire burned fiercely and much damage was done the fir and pine timber in this section. This timber is all owned by the several mining companies and ranchers of the district, very little of it being Government land.

Appropriation of School Funds.

SALEM, Aug. 4.—Saturday evening State Treasurer Charles A. Moore made the annual appropriation of school funds to the several counties in the state, according to the population of the several counties, the amount distributed being \$214,629.25. The latest school census of the state, according to the reports received by the State Superintendent from the several County Superintendents, shows a school population aggregating 138,477 and the sum distributed makes a per capita of \$1.55. Multnomah gets \$41,636.15—Marion is second, with \$14,538.20—Curry receives smallest amount appropriated to any one County, getting \$104.65. Douglas gets \$8,579.25.

The Bohemia Railroad

While at Cottage Grove Sunday the PLAINDEALER editor enjoyed the pleasure of accompanying Conductor Ed Long and a number of excursionists out to the present terminus of the Cottage Grove, Bohemia railroad, which traverses the beautiful and picturesque Row River valley a distance of nearly eleven miles, completing the first contract let. The new road shows every evidence of permanency. Heavy steel rails, good ties closely laid and substantial trestles and bridges were observed as features of its construction. Great pains were evidently taken in its survey to avoid short curves and to obtain an even grade and a good permanent road-bed, though some little trouble will be experienced during the freshest season for a few years as the road unavoidably traverses several miles of rich river bottom country, which overflows during the rainy season. It is understood that a contract for another ten miles of road will soon be let which will complete the road well into the great timber belt as well as the outside district of the Bohemia mines. Work is progressing on the new modern union depot at Cottage Grove and the big new saw mill near the depot has received its machinery and will soon be in clover. Good grain crops are reported in that vicinity, new substantial buildings are in evidence on every hand and a general air of activity and prosperity prevails.

LATEST NEWS.

Tracy's Murderous Career Ended--

Driven to Bay and Wounded,

He Shoots Himself--Re-

ward will be Paid

SPOKANE, Aug. 5.—The Sheriff's office at Davenport received a message from Creston this afternoon, stating that Tracy spent all day Monday at the home of L. E. Eddy, a rancher on Lake Creek, about 3 1/2 miles south of Fellows. The outlaw made his appearance Sunday evening and took possession of the place. He is reported to have been there last night about 7:30. A youth named G. E. Goldfinch telephoned in the story. He declares he came in contact with Tracy on Sunday evening. The outlaw introduced himself and took the boy with him to Eddy's ranch on Lake Creek.

Tracy made himself at home. He compelled them to feed his horse and also to sharpen his life and his razor. Young Goldfinch declares he even let them examine and handle the famous 30-30 rifle one at a time, but kept such close watch that no one had a chance to use it. Monday evening, Goldfinch says, Tracy told him to go home, but to say nothing till Wednesday. The boy departed but hurried to the telephone office at Creston and notified the Sheriff's office at Davenport.

TRACY'S TRAGIC SUICIDE.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 6.—Harry Tracy killed himself about 11 o'clock last night by firing a bullet through his brain. As soon as young Goldfinch brought word to Creston that Tracy was at the Eddy farm, a posse of citizens quickly left for the scene of the outlaw's last exploit.

The posse came upon Tracy, who was working at one of his horses in the Eddy yard. The posse was not more than 50 yards away, and ordered the outlaw to surrender. Tracy stepped behind Eddy and then behind his horse. In this manner he got to the barn and secured his rifle. He darted out of the barn, and for several hours a running fight followed until Tracy disappeared in a wheat field. The posse kept firing wherever the grain was seen to move. The posse lost sight of him and on making a search of the wheat field at daylight found the body. Altogether 15 shots were discharged, and two of those struck him in the leg.

REWARD WILL BE PAID THIS TIME.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 6.—Upon receipt of the news of Tracy's death, The Telegram correspondent propounded the following question to Governor Geer:

Governor, the convict Tracy, after being wounded by the posse in pursuit, killed himself this morning while surrounded. "Do you consider that the men who surrounded and wounded him are entitled to the reward offered by the state?" "Yes, I do," he promptly answered. "The posse surrounding him was the cause of his committing suicide to save himself from hanging, and the possemen are as much to be credited with his death and rewarded for it as though they killed him directly."

CROWDS VIEW BODY.

The news of the finding of Tracy's body this morning spread rapidly in Davenport and great crowds thronged around the Sheriff's office to view it. It was a ghastly sight. The 45 calibre revolver had been placed over the left eye, and the bullet tore away the eye, flesh, frontal bone and almost the top of his head.

The body is now in the hands of officials at Davenport. The posse which came upon Tracy consisted of C A Straub, Dr L. Lanter, Maurice Smith, G J Morrison and Frank Lillingren all reported to be from Creston, Wash.

INQUEST OVER TRACY.

DAVENPORT, Aug. 6.—An inquest was held over the body of Tracy at Davenport at 2 o'clock. The body will be held there until identified by the prison officials from Salem.

DAVENPORT, Aug. 6.—To a m—The Sheriff has not yet decided where to take the body of Tracy, but it is likely that he will take it to Seattle, pending the settlement of the rewards offered by both Washington and Oregon.

There are several claimants for the rewards.

A BLOODY CAREER.

Harry Tracy escaped from the Oregon State Penitentiary at Salem, June 9 last, in company with David Merrill, after killing three guards—Frank W. Ferrell, G. R. T. Jones and B. F. Tiffany—and wounding Frank Ingram, a convict, who tried to prevent his flight. On June 28 Tracy killed Merrill, near Napavine, Wash., shooting him from behind and leaving his body in the forest, where it was found on July 15. On July 3, near Seattle, in a fight with a posse Tracy shot and killed Charles Raymond, a Deputy Sheriff; E. E. Breeze, a policeman, and mortally wounded Neil Rawley, who died the following day. Tracy committed many feats of daring during his flight, in the course of which he eluded various posses when apparently surrounded, and held up numerous farmers, whom he forced to furnish him with food and clothing, and by threats of murdering their families compelled them to cover up his tracks. Perhaps his greatest show of daring was displayed on July 2, at South Bay, near Olympia, when he held up six men and forced four, including Captain Clark, of the gasoline launch N. & S., to embark with him on Puget Sound and pilot him up-stream for 10 hours. In 1897 Tracy murdered Valentine Hoge, a Colorado cattleman, and William Strong, a boy, in the same state.

SENATOR MITCHELL HOME.

Will Soon Go to Hawaii--Talks on

Matters of Legislation Im-

portant to Oregon

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—Senator John H. Mitchell arrived home from Washington at 2 o'clock this afternoon on the belated Chicago-Portland special train on the O. R. & N. He came direct from Washington, where he has been constantly looking after matters of public business concerning Oregon, with the exception of a very brief time he spent at a new Jersey resort to rest up at the adjournment of Congress.

He looked the picture of health, notwithstanding the fatigue of his transcontinental journey. He seemed to be considerably fresher. His first remark to a newspaper man on preparing to leave the Pullman was to the effect that he was exceedingly glad to get back to Oregon.

The Senator will sail for Honolulu the latter part of August; consequently his stay in Portland is limited. The steamer on which he and his fellow Senatorial junketers will journey to the islands will sail August 26, and it is expected that the investigation work which they will carry on in the mid-Pacific islands will consume the time until along toward the time when Congress will convene again.

"There is little I can say of public matters in so brief a time just now," he remarked to a Telegram representative. "The past session of Congress was an extremely busy one, and more important matters were disposed of by this Congress than any previous one. The hardest work was done by the members at the session just concluded. I expect the ensuing session will develop various matters of deep concern to the State of Oregon, although such matters are not now in shape to be intelligently discussed. There are subjects upon which I am very willing to talk, which interest the people of this state, whom I am always glad to serve in any way possible, but to discuss them I prefer to be untrammelled in time and space."

"I have in hand a number of measures which have been claiming my attention at Washington, and I hope before long for a successful result of my efforts to promote the better interests of the state."

The Senator said that he did not think there was any ground for the assertions that have been made through Seattle influences, that the Vancouver post was to be removed.
