Old Soldier Inmate.—Friday Frederick A. Nourse an inmate of the Oregon Soldiers Home, was adjudged insane by Dr. E. V. Hoover and was taken to the State Insane Asylum at Salem Friday night by Sheriff E. L. Parrott and Wm. P. Ross.

"Professor" Nourse as he is most familiarly known, is laboring under the delusion that he has an unexcelled voice for singing and that his specialty is what is commonly known as the "till". In his commitment Dr. Hoover says, "insanity is due to a continuous mental strain on his specialty known as the 'till'." Mr. Nourse is by profession a typewriter and stenographer. He was a veteran of the Civil War, and is 58 years of age. His insanity is of a mild form and it is thought that he will soon entirely recover. Before coming to Roseburg Nourse was a resident of Salem. Prior to his commitment to the asylum he was in jail on a charge of extracting a check for \$36, from an envelope entrusted to his care by Nathan Myers, of the Soldiers Home, and afterwards cashing it at the Douglas County bank. As he had spent all the money and was desirous of giving back an equivalent he accordingly reimbursed Mr. Myers with about \$40 worth of personal property.
