FLAT SALARY HUMBLED.

Senator Daly of Benton county, expressed himself as follows recently on the flat salary question to an Oregonian representative:
"You ask what is my opinion regarding flat salaries for state officers. Well, I don't see any good place to build an opinion that isn't wobbly. The salaries provided for by the constitution are all too small. If we make any change we must raise them and every dollar we raise them comes out of the taxpayer's flat. A few years ago a howl was raised for flat salaries for county officers, because it was thought some of the sheriff's were making too much money in fees. Well, they got flat salaries for the county officers, and the result is the doubling of the taxes in many of the smaller counties and the increasing of the taxes in all the counties, while litigation has become practically free for all, without money and without price. It is as safe an axiom as any in Euclid that fees will be abolished when there is no one interested in keeping them up."

"The State Printer is the officer most generally discussed unfavorably by the public. Let us see how much of it is deserved. The constitution provides that 'the rates to be paid to him for such printing shall be fixed by law.' They are practically so fixed. They are 'Union' rates, and no Legislature will ever vote to reduce those rates. The constitution also provides that 'he shall perform all the public printing for the state which may be provided by law,' and here is the leak in the State Printer's office."

"Tons of stuff are printed that is absolutely useless and, although I have no data, I believe that a large proportion of the printing is not provided by law." The officer or officers who order it done follow custom, and not law, and so the work increases a little every year. Then the printer is abused for demanding regular rates for work he has done."

A son of the great Henry Watterson, bearing his father's full name, has turned rascal by forging an army payroll, enabling him to draw several months salary the second time. People marvel at this, and true, it is a wonder that a boy, coming of a good family and trained up as he doubtless has been should turn out a rascal and a forger, but it is not strange. We have boys right here in this town or county, who though blessed with good homes and honest, influential parents, are plainly speaking, not worth the powder it would take to blow them up. It would be about the best policy for parents to require their reckless, shiftless and worthless boys to get out and hustle for themselves. This would bring them to their senses about as quick as anything.

Bees are the only farm stock that give a valuable product, and yet cost nothing for their keeping beyond providing shelter. What they eat comes from the field and would be of no use unless they gathered it and therefore costs nothing. Sometimes bee-keepers purchase food for their stock, but it is only to replace the honey taken from them with something less expensive.

A Grants Pass news item says: Senator R. A. Booth has been here recently looking after his lumbering interests and while here was interviewed regarding the matter of his being a candidate for United States Senator. Mr. Booth stated emphatically that he was not a candidate and would not be under any circumstances.

A Walla Walla farmer just at dark paid off a tramp for working a day or two. He thought he was handing him two \$1 silver pieces, but in stealing he handed him two \$20 gold pieces. As soon as he discovered his mistake he began hunting the tramp, but he had disappeared.

The opening sales of Oregon hops brought the growers 20 cents per pound. This is enough to give the growers who contracted early in the season for 12 cents per pound, the jim-jams.

Here is a good political platform drafted by the Oregonian: Principles before men. The people before the party. The greatest good to the greatest number, before the continuance of special privileges to the few.

Secretary of State Dnubar has assigned seats to as many members of the Legislature as have requested them, and has proceeded upon the usual rule of "first come, first served."

PLATT'S SLATE SMASHED.

New York Republicans Renominate Odell for Governor. Roosevelt Indorsed.

SARATOGA, N. Y., Sept. 24.—The slate prepared for the New York Republican convention, now in session, by Platt, was broken tonight by Governor Odell when he refused to be a candidate for reelection if George Sheldon were nominated for Lieutenant-Governor. The Governor's declaration created a sensation, and for a time a rupture between himself and Senator Platt was imminent. Governor Odell communicated his desire to Mr. Sheldon, who consulted with Senator Platt, and declined to quit the race. Governor Odell then appealed to Senator Platt to use his influence to get Sheldon to retire. Senator Platt announced he would not make the request, and that Mr. Sheldon was to stay. In the meantime, the Kings County delegation, headed by Lieutenant-Governor Odell's request and immediately resumed its attack upon Mr. Sheldon. The basis of the fight on Sheldon was his alleged leaning toward and interest in trusts as well as distilleries. Governor Odell gave as a reason for his action that he was of the opinion that Mr. Sheldon's candidacy would jeopardize the success of the whole ticket. The Governor added that he had selected Mr. Sheldon for the place, and was his close personal friend, but had reached the conclusion that it was best Mr. Sheldon should retire.

The following ticket was named: For Governor—B. E. Odell, Jr., of Orange. Lieutenant-Governor—F. W. Higgins, of Cattaraugus. Secretary of State—John F. O'Brien, of Clinton. Treasurer—John G. Wickes, of Erie. Attorney-General—Henry B. Conon, of Madison.

THE PLATFORM.
Contains the following interesting paragraphs relating to Roosevelt and the trusts:
We give to President Roosevelt and his administration our heartiest approval and most cordial support. We look forward with confidence to his election to the Presidency in 1904, and so far as this convention has the power, we pledge thereto the earnest effort of the Republican party of this state.
We commend the executive for laying the foundation of social order, education and local government in the Philippine Islands. We commend the action of Congress in securing to the people of those islands their fundamental civil and personal rights; for the election of a legislative assembly, elected by the Filipinos.
We favor reciprocity with that new republic proposed by the Republicans in Congress, giving effective relief to Cuba and substantial benefits to our own people without harm to any American industry.

The greatest National issue is the maintenance of prosperity. The pledge given by William McKinley of abundant work and good wages; based on the passage of a protective tariff bill, has been fulfilled. The integrity of the protective principle must be preserved. The principle is required to maintain the highest scale of American wages and the supremacy of the workshop. While we would encourage business enterprises which have for their object the extension of trade and the upbuilding of our state, we condemn all combinations and monopolies in whatever form having for their purpose the destruction of competition in legitimate enterprises, the limit of production in any field of labor, or the increase of cost to the consumer of the necessities of life, and we pledge the party to the support of such legislation as will suppress and prevent the organization of such illegal combinations.

TREMENDOUS LAND BUSINESS.

Receiver J. H. Booth Visited Ashland and Makes an Interesting Statement.

J. H. Booth, the efficient receiver of the Roseburg Land Office, was in Ashland, Sunday. He reports a rushing trade at the United States Land Office these times—last month's business having brought in to the Federal government over \$100,000 in cash. At the present time there are nearly 4000 applications awaiting publication and final proof, for the purchase of timber lands in this district. The craze for the possession of timber land seems to be increasing instead of diminishing and every available quarter section that is surveyed will soon be taken from the public domain and pass to the ownership of private parties.
The 4000 timber applications are in addition to the regular homestead business of the office, which is of itself considerable. The same or a like condition of affairs rules at the other U. S. land offices in the State of Oregon. The eager desire to acquire timber land in the Pacific states is caused by the depletion of the forests in the northwestern states and the prospective value these lands will have when the Ishman canal is completed and a near market found for the lumber of the coast.—Tidings.

The advent of this enterprising gentleman in our country will give our already large stock interests a new impetus and tend to greatly promote a valuable industry in our country, which is so favorably adapted to stock raising.

Fine Stock Purchased.

A valuable addition to Douglas county's fine stock was made by some of our enterprising citizens last week. While at the state fair Mrs. J. H. Short purchased a fine registered yearling Hereford bull of Mr. Sparks of Nevada. The animal was one of the prize winners and weighs 1500 pounds.

John Casebeer returned Tuesday from Salem where he attended the state fair. He brought home several head of fine pure blood Poland China pigs purchased during his absence, nearly all of them being prize winners. He finds there is a good demand for first-class stock, says the Review. He took to Salem among others, two pigs which he had offered there at \$12.50 per head. They were disposed of there at \$26.25 each. He purchased a blooded brood sow with six pigs for \$75. Four of the pigs have already been disposed of at \$15 each. A male pig which he purchased is a sweepstakes prize winner and weighs about 550 pounds. Mr. Casebeer now has some of the finest stock in this line in the state and will have on exhibition at the coming district fair. As has frequently been remarked, it pays to raise good stock, and more of our people are beginning to realize this fact. No use to raise hogs which take two years to mature. The most profitable stock is ready for market at one year or under, so the most successful growers say.
