**GRIFFIN GOES SCOT FREE.**

Calvin Griffin is Acquitted by a Josephine County Jury of the Killing of Edward Johnson at Waldo.

Having heard the evidence, pleas of the state's and defendant's attorneys, and listened to the judge's charge, the jury in the case of Calvin Griffin charged with the murder of Edw. Johnson two weeks ago at Waldo, acquitted the prisoner of the charge, Saturday, at the trial at Grants Pass.

The witnesses for the state swore positively that the "scrap" occurred before Griffin went home after his gun and when both men were unarmed. The witnesses for defense, on the other hand swore just as positively that the altercation took place after Griffin had returned with his pistol, and attempted to show that his act was one of self defense. District Attorney A. E. Reames made an able summing up of the case for the state and Robert Glenn Smith delivered what proved to be a convincing defense of Griffin to the jury, after which Judge H. K. Hanna charged the twelve men on the law and the evidence.

The case was placed in the hands of the jury at 3 o'clock, Saturday, after which they immediately retired for deliberation upon a verdict. The jurymen were ready to report at 4 o'clock, and returned with the verdict of "not guilty." It is reported that the first four or five ballots taken stood two for murder in the first degree and ten for acquittal.

There seems to be some doubt as to the verdict of acquittal being according to law and the evidence, but it evidently reflects public sentiment in the vicinity of Waldo.
