AN IMPORTANT COUNCIL MEETING

The City Must Pay for Street Work Whether Satisfactory or Not.

The Roseburg city council met in regular session Monday evening, there being but two absentees from the board, Councilmen F. W. Haynes and E. L. Beshford.

A legal opinion from Attorney F. W. Benson and C. L. Hamilton was read, and was in reference to the advisability of the city refusing to pay F. J. Blakely the 20 per cent remainder of the stipulated price for fixing the streets, because the work was not executed in conformity to the contract. The attorneys held that as the city had already paid 80 per cent of the contract price for street work on the warranted action of the council committee appointed to supervise the improvement, it was therefore a virtual acceptance of all the work performed, and the city accordingly became bound to pay the remainder of the contract price. The opinion was ordered on file. The street work of H. J. Wilkins was accepted.

Plat of property belonging to Mrs. E. Moffitt and heirs was offered as an addition to the city of Roseburg. Referred to committee on city improvements.

Saloon bonds of the following persons were accepted and licenses ordered issued: Wm. Van Buren, Schmidt Hotel & Investment Co., G. R. Linser, Fred Poquette, C. H. Harmon, Frank Goodman, C. L. Reed, Wm. Chapple, Frank Kennedy and John Von Pessl.

Bills of F. J. Blakely for street work were referred to committee with instructions to report at an early date. When this committee reports, the recorder will then draw warrants for the amounts which they recommend.

City treasurer was ordered to notify parties on Sheridan and Cass streets that their assessments for additional street work is now due and should be paid at once.

The following petition addressed to the mayor and council was read: "We, the undersigned property owners on Cass street, do oppose the extra rise in the sidewalks, as it is an injury to our property both in looks and value."

Roseburg's First Big Shoot.

• The first annual trap shoot of the Roseburg Gun Club, was held at the trap grounds South of this city Wednesday and was, as expected, a most interesting and successful event. Cannon of Roseburg captured the cream of the event by winning the second event and having the highest average and being first with the others in the fourth event. In all there were forty-two contestants representing the best shots in Oregon. Portland and Coquille City, each contributed a strong squad of marksmen. Southern Oregon was represented by Euvart and Elwood, of Medford, and Redfield, of Glendale, and Lane County was represented by Barney Payne, of Eugene, and Meeks, of Harrisburg, Salem sent Ryan, the highest average man at Eugene shoot. Roseburg had two good squads which shot a pace that was hard to follow.

THE DISTRICT FAIR

Opened Under Very Unfavorable Weather Conditions.

CLOUDS SOON CLEARED AWAY.

A Very Creditable Exhibit in Pavilion and Stock Pens—Interesting Races.

The first day of the Ninth Annual exhibition of the Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society opened at the fair grounds, east of this city, Tuesday morning but on account of the heavy rain early that morning and during the day, very little interest was taken in any department, although the entry clerks were kept fairly busy on pavilion and stock entries.

Wednesday morning dawned cloudy and threatening, but before noon the fog scattered and sunshine renewed the interest of our citizens and every talk of attending the fair, those who had decided not to attend with their exhibits were watching long and anxiously for signs which would lead them to the grounds; and the entry clerks were kept more than busy during the forenoon. Although the exhibits in the pavilion are not as large as at previous fairs, the grade and quality are much superior to any Oregon produce and products heretofore seen.

The green and dried fruit exhibits although very small is a credit not only to Douglas county, but to any county or state upon the Pacific coast. Hon. G. W. Riddle, of Astoria, has the largest display of dried and evaporated fruits, among which are three cases each, on loan on exhibition at the fair held at this place seven years ago. It is remarkable that after so long a time the fruit should look so fresh and (so mellow. It would take an expert to tell the difference between the old and the new fruit.

The display of fancy work is quite large and interesting as are also the paintings in oil and crayon.

The display of poultry is not as large as was expected, but this exhibit is of the finest breeds and would be prize winners at any show.

In the live stock department there are some fairly good stock. This exhibit is not nearly as large as was expected by the association.

Among the individual displays worthy of mention are the booths of the Sykes Hardware Co., Barr's Popular Music House and S. C. Flint's shoes, which occupy the east end of the pavilion. All have very neat and attractive displays.

Wednesday afternoon's racing was well attended and most interesting. At 2 o'clock the crowd was attracted to the race course ground and at 2:30 slatpe the judges called the first race, and from that time the crowd was kept in a fever of excitement by the races which were run without a "hitch." Although the track was slow the races were none the less interesting.

The first race for trotters and pacers of the three minute class, purse \$150, brought out the following horses: "Ricker's" "Zu Lu"; Norton's "I C"; and "Bodecker." The starter lost no time in getting the horses away with a beautiful start. "Zu Lu" and "I C" made a fine race the entire course finishing, "Zu Lu" first, "I C" second and "Bodecker" a bad third. Time 2:43 1/2. The second head resulted in a very close finish between "Zu Lu" and "I C" but at about 100 yards from the wire "I C" was forced off his feet and galloped in second with "Zu Lu" an easy winner and "Bodecker" third. Time 2:44.

Race No. 2—Running one half mile and repeat; purse \$100. "William F." first, "The Maniac" second, "McFarland" third; time 82 1/2. The above race was quite interesting as in both heats the horses were kept well bunched.

Race No. 3—For saddle horses, purse \$25, was the most interesting race of the day, there being seven entries as follows: Williamson's "Bell," Kohlhagen's "Bird," Wollenburg's "Prince W," Corbin's "Bell Fountain," Shallefoe's "Grey Bessie," Wright's "Nancy," Lawson's "Joe."

Considerable money was placed on mutuals as all knew this race would be for blood. After a short time at the post they all got away in a good bunch with "Bell Fountain" and "Nancy" slightly in the lead; all were well bunched on the first turn, but "Bell Fountain" ran wide and Groves seeing his opportunity took "Prince W" to the front where he staid up the back stretch until the last turn. At the quarter "Grey Bessie" who had been held well

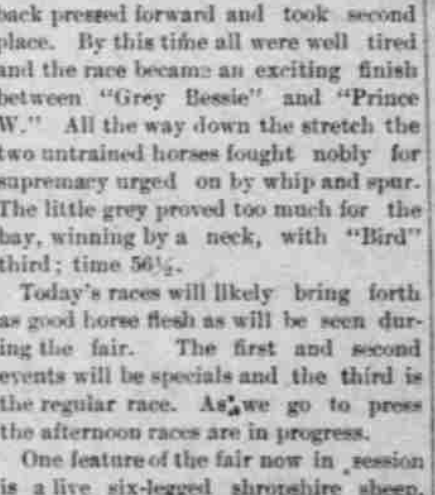
