THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION

The Center of Attraction in Roseburg this Week—The Venerable Dr. Williams, of Minneapolis, The Commanding Figure.

The seventeenth annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention convened in the first Baptist Church, of this city, Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. About 90 out of a possible 150 delegates arrived on Tuesday, and it was evident to on-lookers that the anticipations of a full and weighty program would be fully realized.

The purpose of this Convention is to hear the reports of the various secretaries, treasurers, committees, and for

mutual helpfulness and consultation. This Convention is unlike a Conference in that, it has no power in appointing ministers to their fields of labor. The Baptist church is congregational in government, each society selecting its pastor, and he remains as long as the majority desire or he chooses to resign.

Preliminary services of song and prayer preceded each session. The opening sermon of the convention was preached by Rev. F. W. Cliffe, of Salem, the text "Thy Kingdom Come." The sermon was characteristic for its breadth and beauty of expression. The speaker said "The Lord's Prayer of which my text is a part is marvellous in that it contains a complete program of Christianism as it can be accepted by its own."

"The Kingdom of God" means the "Spiritual Government of God." It is not confined to any one place, but is set up in the hearts of men and women everywhere. "The Kingdom of God" is not yet fully established, but is coming. The processes of religious reception

are very slow. The law of this Kingdom is Love.

The second day session showed an increased attendance of delegates. Dr. Woodby, of Portland, made the remark "The Baptists of all Oregon are here."

The ministers Conference unanimously elected Rev. W. B. Cliffe, President; 1st Vice-Pros. Rev. S. C. Lapham, Portland; 2nd Vice-Pros. Rev. F. M. Cliffe, Salem; Sec. and Treas. Rev. B. C. Miller, Springfield, Oregon.

Rev. C. P. Bailey, Oakland, read a paper on "The Preacher and the Kingdom." Rev. M. M. Bledsoe, of Portland, read a paper on "The relation of the preacher to the finances of the church." At this juncture an offering of \$15 was taken up for current expenses. Rev. W. E. Randall, Portland, gave an eloquent and stimulating address on "The Intellectual Life of the Preacher." Dr. Williams, of Indianapolis, Minn., read a scholarly paper on "Wales the Cradle of Baptist Principles."

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with a service of song and prayer led by the venerable and beloved A. J. Hunsaker, of Minneapolis for

Circuit Court.

The first verdict handed in by a jury at this session of the circuit court was received Monday evening in the case of E. Haight vs. J. Abraham in a suit to recover \$46, the value of a railroad ticket held by the defendant, being awarded to him from the plaintiff by the Justice court in default of payment for a bill for merchandise. The verdict rendered was in favor of plaintiff, Mr. Abraham.

LOVELL PLEADS.

Thos. Lovell, who was arraigned Monday on the charge of murder in the first degree, the alleged crime being the killing of Horace L. Roadman near Wilbur last July, entered a plea Tuesday morning of not guilty. His trial was taken up Wednesday.

PETTY OFFENDERS.

Joe Carter, who pleaded guilty to the charge of stealing razors from a barber at Canyonville, and Arthur Sinclair and Edwin Wayne, self-confessors to the crime of receiving stolen property, all of whom were to be sentenced Tuesday, but did not receive their sentence until Wednesday.

In the case of E. Parsley charged with assault and battery upon the person of Chas. Telles, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and recommended that the punishment be the least provided by the statute—\$50 fine or three months imprisonment in the county jail. The sentence was fixed Wednesday to \$50 fine, which was paid.

THREE SENTENCED.

Joe Carter, larceny, one year; Arthur Sinclair and Edwin Wayne, receiving stolen property, one year each. This above named trio of lawbreakers will be Douglas county's contribution to the state penitentiary from this session of the circuit court.

Carter pleaded guilty to the charge of stealing six razors and a pair of hair clippers from the barber shop of Robert Cosgrue, at Canyonville May 29. Sinclair and Wayne were found in possession of property extracted from a grip belonging to Geo. H. Graves, a traveling salesman, and stolen from the Riddle Hotel, at Riddle, June 19. They also pleaded guilty, and along with Carter, were sentenced by Judge Hamilton to one year each in the state penitentiary.

LOVELL CASE.

Some difficulty is being experienced in securing satisfactory jurors in the case of Thomas H. Lovell, who shot and killed Horace L. Roadman, near their respective homes on the Calapooia, four miles from Wilbur, early in July. Out of the twenty jurors examined Wednesday only six had qualified for the case by evening. They were Thos. Hancock, Thos. Hatfield, Geo. B. McDord, E. L. Bushnell, Isaac Matthews and George

Hendricks. Twelve men on the regular list were still left to select from.

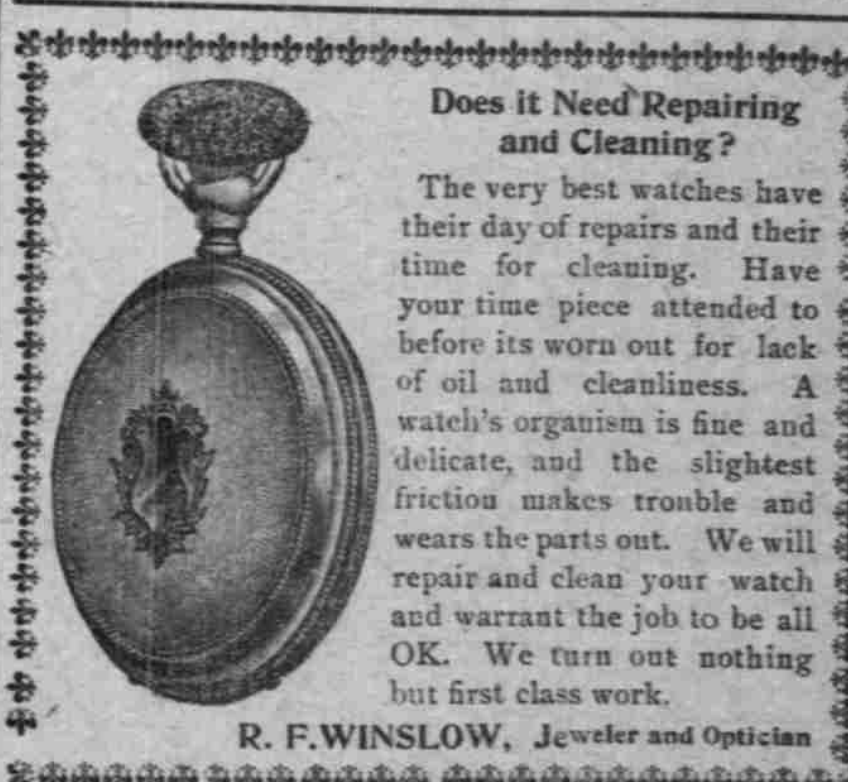
FULL JURY SECURED.

Late this forenoon the jury in the murder case entitled the State vs. Lovell, was completed and comprises the following well known citizens of the county: Thos. Hancock, Thos. Hatfield, G. W. McDord, E. L. Bushnell, Isaac Matthews, Geo. Hendrick, Victor Phillips, Louis Ash, D. W. Hunter, A. Parks, Albert Wilson and Carl Oline.

Soon after the jury was empaneled District Attorney Brown made his statement and witnesses, of which there are many, were called. Up to noon only Coroner Twitchell and Willie Lovell, son of the defendant, and a few others had been examined, their statements being substantially the same as was
