Obituary and Biography. Sylvester Warren Rice was born in Putnam Co., Ill., Nov. 1842. In 1853 he came with his parents across the plains to Douglas county, Oregon. Later he attended Harvard college for four years, graduating from that institution in 1871. On Dec. 25, 1878 he was married to Emma Thayer, who died in January 1891. Rice, near Dillard, Oct. 14, 1902. Funeral services were conducted at the above named place Oct. 16, 1902, the Rev. J. H. Howard, of Dillard, officiating.

TAYLOR BECKLEY KILLED

Run Over by The Switch Engine in the Roseburg Yards.

DEATH WAS INSTANTANEOUS.

Deceased was a Native of Douglas County. Funeral at Oakland Tuesday.

At about 5 o'clock this morning Taylor Beckley, a brakeman aged 23 years was run over and instantly killed in the railroad yards in this city. It seems that Beckley was called to go to work at 5 o'clock on the south bound local freight and was on his way toward the south end of the yard, when he saw Yardman Cart on the west side of the yard near the lantern and oil house, Beckley went to Cart and asked him where they were making up his train, and after being told, he started back across the side tracks to the main line.

Switch engine 1251 was backing up slowly, and it is thought that in trying to mount the rear foot board of the engine that Beckley fell and was dragged under the tender. Engineer Hicks who was in charge of the engine, felt the jar as the rear drive wheel passed over Beckley's body, and thinking that they were off the track, immediately stopped his engine, and Beckley's body was taken from under the engine.

The Company's physician, Dr. G. E. Houck was called and made an examination of the body. He reported that death was caused instantly by the breaking of the spinal column, the left hip and arm were also broken.

No one can tell exactly how Beckley met his death, as Cart, the last man talked to, had his back turned the time of the accident, and Engineer Hicks did not see him until he had stopped his train.

The deceased was a member of Umpqua Hose Co. No. 1, of this city. He had only been railroaded for a few months, but had already had several accidents around the train. About two years ago, he, while jumping between some freight cars in the yards in this city, was struck by a moving freight car and seriously injured. Again while riding on an engine south of here, he was thrown off and narrowly escaped serious injury. But it seems that he was destined to be killed by the engine, and so met his fate early this morning. County Coroner Dr. Twichell took charge of the remains, and moved them to the undertaking parlors, where an inquest was held this afternoon.

The deceased was a son of James Beckley of Riddle. His mother and a sister reside at Oakland where the funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon. He was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, of a genial and companionable disposition, in consequence of which he made many friends, who were greatly shocked and grieved at his terrible, untimely death.

TILLAMOOK STAGE HELD UP.

Douglas County Man Relieved of \$100. Make a \$200 Haul.

NORTH YAMHILL, Oct. 18.—The Tillamook stage was held up tonight, shortly after 9 o'clock, by three masked men, five miles out from North Yamhill. The robbers secured \$100 in money, and made their escape. C. F. Levens, of Portland, lost \$100, while two other passengers, O. H. Davenport and Oscar French, of Tillamook, lost another \$100 between them.

The wagon-road on which the hold-up occurred is the main thoroughfare between North Yamhill and Tillamook. The country through which the road passes is very mountainous, and is one of the most thickly wooded sections of the state, in fact an ideal spot for stage hold-up.

The robbers, three in number, were heavily masked and carried rifles and revolvers. At the foot of a steep grade they appeared in the road at the horse's heads and with ugly threats commanded the driver to check his team and dismount. The voices of the highwaymen aroused the curiosity of one of the passengers, who, when he opened the door of the coach was ordered to step quickly out, and stand alongside the driver. The other passengers followed suit. Two of the robbers kept the passengers under cover of their guns, while the third man gathered up the purses and watches thrown on the ground. Any attempt to resist the highwaymen would have been useless, as the driver was at the mercy of the desperadoes the moment he checked rein on his horses. After satisfying themselves that they had secured all the money and valuables from the driver and passengers the robbers disappeared into the deep woods. The stage proceeded on its way, and telephoned the news into North Yamhill from Fairdale, the first station beyond.

Serious Accident to Mrs. Camp.

Mrs. E. M. Camp of the Victoria mine met with a serious accident while returning from an outing at the Nest on Quince creek, Tuesday. The horse she was riding became frightened near Galesville and ran about three-quarters of a mile, then stumbled and threw the rider on the large rocks in the creek bed. Mrs. Camp was rendered unconscious and sustained a fracture of the left radius, a large gash was cut under the chin, and she was severely bruised on the body. Dr. Bowersox dressed the wounds, reduced the fracture, and she was taken to the hospital at Portland on Wednesday night's train. Considering the place where she was thrown she was very fortunate in not sustaining more severe injuries or being killed outright.—News.

Benjamin Caro, son of Simon Caro, of this city, has returned from San Francisco, where he, with his mother and sisters have been visiting. Mrs. Caro, who has been under medical treatment at that place, is much improved and will soon return to Roseburg.
