Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf Arranged for Coos Bay Outlet Before It Was Absorbed in Rock Island System.

(Portland Oregonian.) Some time ago currency was given a eport that the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad was behind the Great Central project between Salt Lake City and Coos Bay. That was given little attention then, because other probabilities seemed stronger. Since the St. Paul has been eliminated from the ranscontinental railroad situation by its arrangement with the Union Pacific, there has been more disposition to the Coos Bay enterprise, and the following letter bearing on that feature of the case is illuminative:
