#### Activity in the New Townsite.

Carpenters are pushing work on new buildings in the new addition to Roseburg as rapidly as material can be secured. Owing to a scarcity of shingles and flooring, work is almost at a standstill on the Great Central headquarters for a new two-story building 25x30 feet. It has just been completed near the new railroad building. The upper floor will be fitted up for a gallery and the lower floor for a store room. Lumber is being placed on the grounds for many other buildings, and lots on the Main street have advanced from \$250 to \$300 each. Many lots have been disposed of recently and it will only be a matter of a little time when they will have all been sold. Mrs. Emma A. Orcutt, of Portland, has invested heavily in property in the new Great Central townsite. She is a woman of means and will immediately begin the erection of a business building 50x100 feet on the North extension of Jackson street. She also expects to build several residences on the newly opened tract. Other investors expect to build there soon. About 300 lots have already been sold there.

#### Train Delayed by Wreck.

About 9:45 Sunday evening, a tall end collision occurred two miles north of Yoncalla, between two extra north-bound freight trains. The first train in charge of Conductor Hastings had taken wood at the wood yard and had recalled their flagman and started out as the second train in charge of Conductor Veach and Engineer Patrick was coming down the hill slowly, so they could stop and take wood also. The first train broke into, and before Engineer Patrick could get his train stopped he collided with the rear end of the first train literally telescoping the caboose and his engine, and breaking up several cars. Conductor Veach received a few slight scratches, and Drakeman Barkley had his knee cap injured by a fall on some rocks while jumping off. A wrecker was called from this city and succeeded in clearing the track so the north-bound passenger, which was detained there could leave at 5:15 a. m. today.
