THE ANNUAL POULTRY SHOW.

A Fine Exhibit. Many from the Outside. The Attendance is Large as Usual.

The Third Annual Exhibition of the Douglas County Poultry Association which opened in the new Douglas County Bank Building Wednesday is now in full progress. The display is the best that has ever been seen in the county, there being a large number of good birds and some very fine ones. As we go to press Judge Cobbleddick, of Oakland, Calif., is at work scoring the Single Comb Brown Leghorns. The Barred Plymouth Rocks were scored yesterday, but the winners have not yet been announced. B. F. Kenney, of Coquille, Ore., and Wm. H. Arps, of Santa Cruz, Cal., are in attendance. Among the entries from outside the County are: m Bros. of Fruitvale, Cal., S. C. Brown, Leghorns; Wm. H. Arps, of Santa Cruz, Calif., Brown Leghorns and Barred Plymouth Rocks; Jas. Hogue, of Oakland, Calif., 6 pair of ducks; W. C. Duncan, of Turner, Ore., White Minorcas. There are 60 entries in the S. C. Brown Leghorns, and about 50 in Barred Plymouth Rocks, 2 pairs of geese, 12 turkeys, and about 20 ducks are entered. Calkins White Plymouth Rocks are conspicuous as usual. Dyerlinger has a cage of Chinese Pheasants, one of Silver Pheasants, and several couples of Pigeons. Jocko, the monkey, is also in evidence and causes much amusement among the children.

The prices of two pairs of fowls were won last night by numbers 32 and 36, it is not yet known who holds the lucky numbers. Four more pairs will be given away. Drawing at 9 p. m. each evening. The attendance is excellent. You'll miss it, if you fail to attend this show.

Secretary Hamlin is one of the busiest men in town, his time being completely occupied in looking after the business and financial end of the exhibition; answering questions, showing visitors about and explaining the merits of the various fowls. One thing that serves to stimulate the energy of the poultry raisers toward the improvement of their fowls, is the appreciation and approval they received from the people in general and in this respect the association has every cause to feel encouraged from the fact that the people of Roseburg and Douglas County are becoming more interested and enthusiastic in regard to poultry raising each succeeding year, and the work of this association. This year as on former occasions the exhibit speaks for itself and it is the duty of everyone in Roseburg and vicinity to patronize the show and further encourage the meritorious work of the association. The show closes Saturday evening, Dec. 20, and will be open each day and evening until that date.

WANTED ON CHARGE OF LARCENY

Two Bad Characters Arrested at Oakland and Lodged in the County Jail.

Sheriff Parrott and Constable Harry Pinkston brought John Smith and Chas. Morris to this city from Oakland last night and lodged them in jail to answer to the charge of larceny of a saddle from the barn of Sidney Jakes, near Glendale last Sunday night. It seems that these criminals had a falling out with each other along the route of their travels, the farmers have been missing their chickens.
