CHRISTMAS AT THE M. E. CHURCH.

Christmas Eve found the Methodist Episcopal church filled with a happy throng of children and adults to see the Christmas trees and welcome Santa Claus. The rooms were tastefully decorated with evergreens and holly, and with fir, and bunches of mistletoe hung from the chandeliers. The trees, well filled with holiday gifts, sparkled with electric lights.

A nicely arranged program was rendered. Songs and recitations were interspersed with fine selections by the orchestra. The little folks acquitted themselves in their usual excellent manner. The primary class sang "Santa Claus is Coming." A telephone had been placed on the platform, and a long distance message was received from Klamath Falls saying Santa had already departed for Seattle. As the program proceeded the enthusiasm of the audience increased with leaps and bounds, as messages were received saying he had just departed from Seattle, or from Portland.

A class of children sang "Bells are Ringing." It disclosed many very sweet voices. Just then a message came from Winchester saying Santa was on the way to Roseburg, and just then bells jingled and horns tooted, and in bounded Santa Claus himself. He was given a royal ovation, but soon departed to make other children happy, after directing the bestowal of gifts.

AT THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH.
Christmas, with its attendant exercises, is an event which is looked forward to with a great deal of interest and anticipation by the friends and patrons of the Sunday School of the First Christian church as this time and the time and manner of the arrival of Santa Claus is usually kept a secret from the scholars.

The school has just closed very successfully a year's work, having had an average attendance for the entire year of 77 scholars, and the regular Sunday collection for the year amounting to \$137.54.

On Christmas eve the Sunday School of the Baptist Church, enjoyed the festivities of Christmas by appropriate exercises consisting of songs and recitations by the scholars. The tree and decorations were the most tasteful and beautiful ever placed in the church, and were the handiwork of the B. Y. P. U. of the church. A beautiful lighting star assisted with its brilliant light in making the occasion the glad test, most joyous of the entire year for the children.

SUPPLEMENTAL CHAMBER CO.

Filed Articles of Incorporation—Capital Stock \$3000.

The Supplemental Chamber Co. filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk in Roseburg Friday. The capital stock is \$3000, divided into three hundred shares of ten dollars each, and the incorporators are H. B. Gillette, Joe Lyons and W. W. Kent, the first named being of this city and the other two of Drain. As stated in the filing articles, the purpose of the company is "to manufacture and sell supplemental chambers for guns, rifles, pistols and other arms." The principal office and place of business of the company will be at Drain.

The supplemental chamber for firearms is an invention of Mr. Gillette with which the Roseburg public is by this time too familiar to warrant any special mention from us. Convenience and economy are the merits on which it stands.
