

THE LAST SAD RITES

The body of the late Representative in Congress, Thomas H. Tongue, has ended its long journey, and from the comfortable home he built and guarded was reverently and mournfully carried Sunday to its final resting place. Not only the stricken widow and bereaved family, but his many friends, among whom he had lived so long, and his host of personal friends, but all the people of Oregon, mourn his untimely death. The state, even the Nation, has suffered a loss. Few men, in the same space of time, ever did more for Oregon; none was ever better prepared and equipped to serve this state than he, and the great throng in attendance at the last sad rites over the remains of the distinguished Oregonian, which included members of the Oregon legislature, state officials and representatives of both branches of Congress, paid homage and public honor to his life and work.

THE OREGON LEGISLATURE.

The members of the present legislature are apparent on the whole rather above the average in fitness for the duties to be performed. Though the newspaper men have their little fling at the legislators, we don't mean to be taken seriously always, says the Telegram. While among 90 men who take up the body there are always some of inferior character, mentally or morally, or both, most of them are honest, intelligent, and animated by a desire to do the right thing, and the Oregon Legislature have as a rule made a pretty fair record, as compared with the Legislatures of other states. Our legislators have been paragons of economy and other virtues in comparison with some Legislatures of California and other states. Some bills that would better be not passed will doubtless become laws, while some better bills will fail; there will be some unnecessary expenditures, and perhaps selfish motives rather than the public weal will triumph in some minor matters; but on the whole we may expect fairly good work, and beneficial results, from this body of lawmakers. As a rule, they are no doubt honest and capable, and it is better to have confidence in their integrity and ability than to regard them with suspicion and bestow censure upon them that is possibly for the most part undeserved.

Special Agent, Grygla, of the United States Land Office with headquarters at Roseburg, who is at Lakeview investigating the timber and other land entries in that district, has over 300 claims to look into and in every case there is evidence of irregularity the claimants will be summoned to show cause why their titles should not be canceled. It does not matter whether or not patent to the land has been issued.

When Gov. Geer retires from office, is defeated for U. S. senator and retires to the quiet of his farm to raise chickens and thresh wheat, a good many prominent Oregon newspapers will be short on editorial topics.

B. F. Anis is now sole proprietor of the Springfield Nonpartisan, John W. Kelly having retired as editor after the first issue—by request.

Mr. Simon will soon resume the practice of law in Portland.

Clerks For Legislature.

Now each Senator will have a private clerk, in consequence of a resolution introduced by Senator McGinn Thursday and passed by a vote of 16 to 11, four "absent." If the members of the House follow this example, and they have the same need of clerks that the Senators have, the number will be 50; cost, 900x17x3, \$9500. But if the House refuses to indulge in this luxury the resolution will cost only \$3300. One way or another the Kukulnall law will be battered down and ignored. But there is a good deal of truth in Senator McGinn's declaration that if a Senator is to do good work, and do it thoroughly, on committees, checking his bills and documents in order, looking up data, and so being always prepared for whatever comes up, he needs the service of a clerk. It is an innovation that will not be generally approved, but it will doubtless stick. Oregon is getting to be a larger state, with more business to attend to, every two years, and its people must expect its legislators to move along in more style than they used to do. Considering that they receive only \$3 a day for 40 days, while the members of the California Legislature receive \$5 for 60 days, and those of other states \$5, or more, the innovation is not one for the people to tear their hair about. Yet its adverse criticism by the press, representing public opinion, may be expected.—Telegraph.

Big Mining Transaction.

A deed in a big mining transaction at Myrtle Creek was filed with County Clerk Shanbrook Saturday. This deed transfers the Continental Mine from W. B. Stewart to the Continental Gold Mining Co., of Portland, for a consideration of \$1,000,000.

Grandma Minns, in charge of the O. R. & N. Co's. hotel at Meacham, recently destroyed by fire, will soon take the position of manager of the company's hotel in Huntington.

INTERESTING LEGISLATIVE NOTES

Doings of the Members of the House and Senate in the Legislative Assembly

There are three Smiths in the senate. Shelley has succeeded in introducing his bill licensing warehousemen. It is No. 75.

Two bills have been introduced to provide for the payment of the Indian war veterans as petitioned for.

It is predicted that several county-seat fights will be rather warm, that of Malheur county being the hottest.

The legislative assembly attended the funeral of the late Congressman T. H. Tongue at Hillsboro on Sunday in a body.

Housebrough has introduced a fellow servant bill in the House. McGinn has also introduced a fellow servant bill in the Senate.

The official canvass of the vote for governor by the joint committee of the Legislature gives Chamberlain a majority of 256 over Furnish.

Senator Mulkey has introduced a bill providing for taxation of express, telephone, telegraph and oil companies; also a bill to prohibit the exhibition and sale of obscene pictures.

Senator Pierce, of Morrow, Umatilla and Union has introduced a concurrent resolution providing for a constitutional amendment making the terms of county officers four years instead of two.

Both the Senate and the House adjourned Thursday afternoon until Monday, in order to allow the state printer time in which to catch up with the flood of bills in the hands of the printers.

The question of what the legislature will do with the normal schools will be a live one. The governor's recommendation that these schools be reduced to two, in his inaugural address was loudly applauded.

Hain, of Clatsop, has brought forward a bill to prevent the unlicensed use of secret order emblems. The bill aims to keep persons from wearing badges or emblems of societies to which they do not belong as members.

The mother of Governor Chamberlain came all the long journey from her home in Old Mississippi to witness that which is to her the crowning event of her life—the inaugural ceremonies which made her beloved son governor of Oregon.

A flood of bills has swarmed the State Printer's office and several days will be required for that department to bill itself out. The senators are eager to get their pet measures in at the head of the rush, so they may not get left in the shuffle.

The Portland charter bill, which, under ordinary circumstances would have consumed the greater part of the week, became a passed measure, with the exception of its enrollment and the signature of the governor, within twenty-four hours after its introduction in the house.

ADJOURNED TERM CIRCUIT COURT

Ed G. Becker and Harry Howard Each Get Two Years.

Circuit court for Douglas county opened in adjourned session in Roseburg Friday morning with Hon. J. W. Hamilton on the bench.

Eighteen civil and two criminal cases were at once acted upon. Ed G. Becker and Harry Howard will be Douglas county's total contribution from this term of court to the state penitentiary.

Becker pled guilty to stealing tobacco from Davis & Atkinson's grocery store (formerly W. L. Cobb's), and was given a sentence of two years. Harry Howard confessed to stealing a twenty dollar gold piece from William Kellher, of Yoncalla, at the Roseburg depot on the 10th of last December. Howard made a rather lengthy statement before the court, but it did not help his case any, for he received the same sentence that was given Becker—two years.

"I'm much obliged," said Howard, seating himself, "but I don't think I got justice."

"I think the sentence you got was very light, considering the statement you made," replied the judge.

Beilen, of Linn county, has come forward with a bill to meet the sleeping-car octopus. He proposes a tax of \$400 per year on liquor selling in railroad cars. Mr. Beilen has also presented a measure for taxation of corporations.

Senator A. C. Marsters, of Douglas, has presented and is championing a bill in the senate, providing for an irrevocable school fund for Douglas county. It is a very worthy and important measure for his county. This bill is being looked after in the house by Representative I. B. Riddle.

Representative Malarkey, of the Multnomah delegation, has taken to Salem with him a bill which is intended to place a tax on legacies. He has arranged a carefully graduated scale of taxes ranging from 1 percent to 6. The bill will be popular with those not having expectations.

The senatorial situation is developing and the supporters of Hon. C. W. Fulton now claim he will have 30 votes on the first ballot. The first ballot on senator will be taken tomorrow, Tuesday.

Lawrence T. Harris, who has been elected to the important and influential position of Speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives at the present session, is a native Oregonian and is not yet 30 years of age. He was born in Linn county and educated in the public schools of Albany and Eugene, and was graduated from the law department of the state university of Michigan, and has since been practicing his profession, and with marked success, at Eugene. He has served continuously as deputy prosecuting attorney for his district. In 1900 he was elected a representative from Lane county and re-elected in 1902 by an increased majority.

Hon. George C. Brownell, who was on Monday chosen by the republican senate caucus to preside over the deliberations of the upper house during the 22d biennial session of the legislature, was born in New York state in 1859. He was admitted to the bar in Kansas, where he held several important positions. He came to Oregon in 1891, and has since been a prominent figure in the republican party of Clackamas county and the state. He has been a member of county, district and state conventions. Three times he has been elected a member of the state senate from Clackamas county and has been prominently mentioned for Congressional honors. Mr. Brownell is a man of strong personal magnetism and an able orator and debator.

C., who ordered the change upon considering the report of Special Inspector Wm McMillan, recommending the acceptance of an offer from the management of the new bank building. The land office as it is, is one of the most convenient in the country, the rooms, four in number, are large, comfortable and well ventilated and lighted. The corner room is occupied by Register J. T. Bridges and his assistants, Receiver J. H. Booth has his vest room. In the rear room is a vault and record room, and a contest room, and a large corridor and cloak room. The land office officials are elated over their new location and a visitor is greeted with a most pleasant smile.

Two of the rooms formerly occupied by the land office are to be occupied by the firm of Schibrede & Gray, and T. P. Johnson, a prominent Portland dentist, will open dental parlor in the others.
