**REALISTIC EVANGELISTIC
PRACTICE.**

On Monday night the editor of the **PLAINDEALER** went to hear a noted Evangelist of the Presbyterian Ministry of Los Angeles, Calif., speak in the Southern Methodist church and found the speaker to be very earnest and positive in his utterances and he denounced wrong doing in no uncertain sound, and we think that if the talk had been to mature men and women that there could have been no objection to what he said; but when he mentioned horrible crimes, unnatural crimes, red handed murderers of innocents, more damnable in its nature than Herod's crime at Bethlehem, and speaking as he did to children, young men with young women sitting beside them the recital and such affairs must have brought the blush of offended modesty or virtue or had a tendency to blurt and deaden the finer sensibilities of refined natures. Now the writer has heard many of the noted Evangelists of the country and he never heard such recitals of depravity uttered from a pulpit before. This may be the kind of preaching that it takes to wake up Oregon sinners. It may be that the very truths of hell have to be invoked to save souls on the Pacific slope, but one thing is certain, and that is, the fear of the devil does not create a love for God and the blazon of effrontery of parading the lowest forms of vice and crime to young and old, to virtuous and vicious, to pure of heart and morally depraved has not a tendency to make pure the mind of either class; and if the good and evil thoughts aroused by the preacher could have been weighed in the balance we believe that the sentence "mens, mens, tekel upharin" would have been written against the preacher's sermon. Now we have no desire to place any stumbling block in the way of any preacher who is sincere and earnest, but there are times when men have zeal without knowledge and we think that the preacher lacked a knowledge of the effect of suggestive evil when he talked of crime in the manner he did. Part of the crimes he denounced were possibly common. Some were positively uncommen, and before there will ever be a change and turning away from some of the offenses there will have to be a thorough upheaval of society affairs going down to the very foundation of our civilization. Not only among the so called wicked and vicious but among the very elect; and for a preacher to denounce free thinkers for offenses common among professed Christians is entirely out of place, for it has not even the merit of whipping the devil around a stump.

Valley Wool Growers to Combine.

Plans are now being formulated to combine the entire wool clip of the Willamette Valley. Wools will be graded and baled to meet trade requirements and shipped direct to the Eastern Mills, saving all middle profits. It is estimated under the new method of selling, it will add to the profits of the growers over \$100,000.00 now going into the pockets of the middle men. One of the largest wool ranches in Portland has been secured and is being fitted up with baling machinery and grading tables. When the wools are all in shape for the market, sale will be advertised in the East and the wool sold under sealed bids. Having several million pounds together and being properly packed, it would warrant Eastern Mills sending out their buyers to buy direct from the range. S. Extract from the Presidents Speech.

Among other good things the President said in his speech at Duluth, Wis., we clip the following: I think I speak for the majority of the American people when I say we are not in the least against wealth as such, whether individual or corporate; that we merely desire to see any abuse of corporate or combined wealth corrected and remedied; that we do not desire the abolition or destruction of big corporations, but, on the contrary, recognized them as being in many cases efficient economic instruments, the results of an inevitable process of economic evolution and only desire to see them regulated and controlled so far as may be necessary to subserve the public good. We should be false to the historic principles of our government if we discriminated, either by legislation or administration, either for or against a man because of either his wealth or his poverty. There is no proper place in our society either for the rich man who uses the power conferred by his riches to enable him to oppress and wrong his neighbors, nor yet for the demagogic agitator who instead of attacking abuses as all abuses should be attacked wherever found, attacks property, attacks men of wealth, as such, whether they be good or bad, attacks corporations whether they do well or ill, and seeks in a spirit of ignorant rancor, to overthrow the very foundations upon which rest our national well-being.

Last Monday at Arbilene, Kansas a farmers' protective union under the auspices of the American Federation of Labor was organized. Each township is to have a society, only farm hands and renters being eligible; county organizations will follow, covering the entire state before harvest time. The object will be to secure uniform wages and better prices for grain.

BASE BALL.
The chances are that Roseburg will have two teams the coming season. The one is to be run exclusively as a private money making or personal aggrandizement and the other, the Roseburg Base Ball Club, for honor and reputation of the city. The latter club through its board of directors, made every kind of proposition that could be made and every offer of harmony and co-operation was promptly turned down and it is now up to the citizens to see who they will support—the boys who have to win honor for Roseburg or private speculation at public expense. While the Jackson proposition may look fair upon its face yet the whole matter simmered down is not for a Roseburg baseball team, but, well draw your own conclusion.

Raking in the Swag.

Last Monday night at Col. Reed's Saloon on Jackson street, Bud Thomas, Ed. Bridges and others were engaged in playing the "high falutin'" game of Twenty-One. A game that gives the dealer a better chance than stud horse poker. Well the game progressed and Bridges lost \$5 and \$5 right along until he got to the bottom of his pile which was about \$100.00. When the flabiness of his pocket was an aching void Bridges got a lump in his throat as large as his fist, and at this point it is said he threw out his arms and raked in all the money on the table, part of which he had lost and it is said that two twenty dollar gold pieces fell into the drawers of the dealer's table where there was a loaded revolver. Bridges sprang around to the side of the table where the drawer was and Thomas opposed him and somehow got his little finger into Bridges' mouth and Bridges came down on that finger like the teeth of a coyote trap. Thomas now is wearing that finger done up in a rag for ornamental purposes. Bridges with Thomas' finger in his mouth was enabled to secure the two twenty dollar gold pieces and also the gun. He then with the gun held Thomas at bay and backed out to the front door of the Saloon when he took out the cartridges from the gun and then broke the gun in two and threw the whole on the bar and left the saloon.

The affair caused considerable stir among the sporting fraternity and on Tuesday, after an examination of the witnesses to the transaction, a complaint was sworn to by Bud Thomas, charging Bridges with theft of the money. A warrant was issued for Bridges' arrest and placed in the officers hands. In the meantime, Bridges had gone to Comstock, where he is employed. It is not likely that charges will be pressed against Bridges because if they are, it will open up to prosecution the parties who run the place where the gambling took place, and if Roseburg is any nine out of every ten of the cities on the Pacific slope in this respect, the case will be settled out of court and the quicker this is done and the less there is said about the matter the better it will be for the sporting fraternity in Roseburg.

A Statement.

When asked about the plans of his Club for the coming season, Manager Sam Josephson, of the Roseburg Base Ball Club, gave out the following statement:
The organization of baseball in this city on a substantial basis is completed, and the completion of the Willamette Valley League schedule, apportioning the dates among the four towns of the League is all that is necessary to start things going. The local directors are all men of prominence and the field captain, Mr. Bradley, who will temporarily act as coach, is a player with a good record behind him, so that the organization has the confidence of everyone. Nearly every business man in town has joined the club, and we have twenty of the best players. It is probable that the league game will be played on grounds in Wall's addition on South Jackson street, but if satisfactory arrangements cannot be made to get this location, a proposition which has been made to our directors to play the game in another part of town will undoubtedly be accepted. "According to program" the league will begin on or about the first day of May, 1903.

Mysterious Fire.

Last Friday night at Flourary Valley, a barn belonging to Dr. S. Hamilton was burned. The next day Howard Ward, who is renting the place and lost about four hundred dollars' worth of personal property, had U. S. Flourary arrested charging him with the offense of arson. The investigation held before Justice Buchanan failed to connect Flourary with the offense in any manner and the case against him was dismissed.

On Tuesday night twenty-five citizens of Roseburg assembled in the Firemen's hall for the purpose of perfecting the organization of the Roseburg Base Ball Club. W. C. Gray was elected Chairman and John M. Throner Secretary.
After considerable discussion pro and con and covering all the difficulties in the matter of previous exploiting the base ball field in the past and for years to come the following resolution was passed:
Resolved that we, the patrons and baseball players of Roseburg, hereby organize a club to be known as the Roseburg baseball club.
