Apportionment of School Funds.

County Treasurer Dimick has today set aside twenty-two thousand two hundred and eighty-eight and sixty-two one-hundredths dollars, (\$22,288.62) in the county school fund. This will be apportioned among the various school districts, giving each district first \$35 to make up what was lacking from the \$50 apportionment to each district last October, and in addition to this about \$3.00 for each pupil in the district of school age, according to the enumeration of last June. Clerks will probably receive their orders by the middle of the week.

On account of the large apportionment at this time of the year, no district will be required to forfeit any of its money at the end of the school year, but will be allowed to retain whatever it may have on hand at that time.

Gold Bug is shut down.

The Gold Bug mine, on Mount Reuben, a short distance southwest of Glendale, has been temporarily closed down on account of an impending change of management. Senator Jones and associates, of Nevada, who have owned and operated the Gold Bug since its beginning, are preparing to dispose of their interests to an Eastern company. The names of the purchasers are not yet given it, but out, is known the mine will be sold and that the new owners will operate the famous old Gold Bug on a larger scale than ever. The mine is opened to a depth of 600 feet, and presents a vast body of high-grade ore.

The Copper Stain mine, on Mount Reuben, owned by the Dana Bros, is about to be sold. This mine is well developed, and will be equipped with a stamp mill and machinery by the new owners, whose identity is likewise unknown yet.—Glendale.

Bubonic Plague in Kansas.

It is reported from McPherson, Kan., that bubonic plague has appeared at Burtha and Frederick, on the Missouri Pacific road, in Rice county. The disease was imported by Italian laborers on the road, and within the last four days nine deaths have occurred. The persons afflicted are taken sick suddenly and live but a few hours. It was first thought the disease was black mazzox, and then it was called Texas fever.

Bryan and Cleveland.

W. J. Bryan says in his paper that if the reorganization element gets control of the democratic party, Grover Cleveland should be the nominee for president, and in a sarcastic way he reproves Henry Watterson for speaking so bitterly of the former president.

Mr. Bryan quotes a friend of Mr. Cleveland as saying that Mr. Cleveland has never yet refused to serve his party, and while he may have an aversion to again entering public life, he will not fail us at a time when he is most needed.

Mr. Bryan then continues: "Well, if the reorganizers obtain control of the party, why should not Cleveland be the nominee? If the party has made a mistake in taking the people's side, and in casting Mr. Cleveland aside, why should it not take Mr. Cleveland up again? If it decides to cast the people aside, it would be a great deal better to nominate Mr. Cleveland, so that the voters would know certainly what they were voting for (for or against) than to nominate some other 'putocrat with Cleveland's views and sentiments, but whose position is not known to the people."

"Let us have a clean and open fight between the democratic party and Mr. Cleveland. If Mr. Cleveland is defeated he can vote the republican ticket as usual. If he is successful in securing the nomination—well, he will doubtless support the ticket."

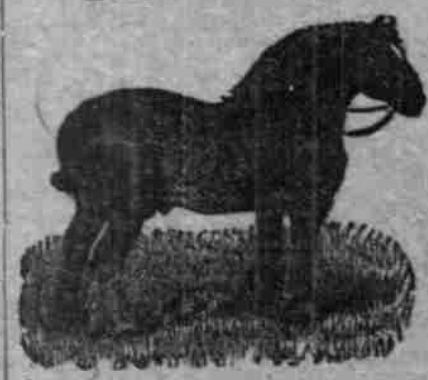
