Among the laws that will be attacked are several that favor the product of union labor exclusively, the most obnoxious to the Employers' Association being that which forbids the letting by the city of printing contracts to any but unionized shops. It also will oppose the eight-hour law now enforced by the city administration, as well as the ordinance requiring an applicant for an engineer's license to be examined by a board composed entirely of union men.
