

**The Bulls, the Bears and the Farmer.**

It is amusing to watch the antics of the bulls and bears in the great markets at Chicago and St. Louis, says the Farmer. The leaders of the herds probably do not know the difference between a field of wheat and a field of rye, a harrow and a clod crusher, but they have much to do in deciding what the farmer shall get for his stuff. They farm the farmers instead of the land, and raise their crops on the floor of the exchanges. It seems that this season the surly bears of the St. Louis boards did the sowing, while the prospects are that the greedy Chicago bulls will toss the profits into their strong boxes on their horns. It is strange anomaly, but nevertheless true, that these queer contests actually fix the market price of the commodity being traded on, while the farmer who produces all the stuff has little or nothing to say in the transaction. Although there could be no wheat but for the farmer, the conditions are such that he has no more to say about what he shall charge for it than if he never saw wheat grow. If he can manage to unload his crop about the time the bulls are counting their profits and reaping their harvest he will get the benefit of the high price worked up by these speculators. Otherwise he will have to fall back on his old and overworked friends, "supply and demand." The bulk of the wheat the bulls and bears were fighting over was stored in the elevators. The bulls generally have it nailed down and play it against the "visible supply." It always happens that the bears settle up while the new wheat is coming into market, and about the time the season's crop is garnered and stored the prices have fallen very perceptibly.

**Want Neck Shaved Free.**

An order recently made by the Salem Journeyman Barbers' Union directing their employers to charge their customers 5 cents extra for neck shaves has created a big stir in labor union circles. Groups of men gathered on the sidewalks discussing the matter, and at one time a wordy war promised trouble. The barbers' union published a notice declaring the Anderson and Bunce shops unfair and requesting all union men not to patronize them.

These two shops refused to charge their customers 5 cents extra. Their contention is that their trade is largely with workmen and farmers, who can not afford to pay 15 cents for a shave and 5 cents extra for a neck shave. Some of the shops have been charging the 5 cents extra for some time. The offending shops were exempt from the regulation but the new order includes them. Union leaders claim that all members of labor unions will cease to patronize the two shops named, but Anderson says he has the voluntary promise of numerous union men to help him keep the price of shaves at 15 cents straight. Union barbers in his employ refused to quit when his card was taken away. A warm contest is looked for before the barbers' trouble is ended.—Albany Herald.
