Balkan Consolidation.

Paris, August 23.—The report of the Italian squadron being mobilized to sail for the Turkish coast gives color to a rumor that has been current here for several days.

It is nothing more nor less than it is thought a secret agreement has been arrived at by the powers to end the Balkan troubles and put the Moslems west of the Bosphorus by a consolidation of the Balkan principalities into one government under Prince Nicholas, of Montenegro. It will be recalled that he has always been a steadfast friend of Russia and is the father of the late emperor.

Students of the 8th and 9th regiments of the Russian army, who profess to believe this the promised solution of the troubles that have proved a menace to the peace of Europe for years. It was learned in official quarters Friday that the action of Russia in ordering a naval squadron to Turkish waters may be speedily followed by important joint naval action on the part of the powers. Communications are at present being exchanged between the powers relative to a joint naval demonstration before Salonica. The final determination will depend largely on Russia, but if a joint demonstration shall be determined on, the fleets of France and Austria will certainly co-operate, and it is probable that the fleets of all the European powers having Turkish interests, except possible Germany, which, throughout, has not favored taking energetic steps against Turkey, will take part in the demonstration.

Sir Liang Cheng, the Chinese Minister, on Friday, informed Acting Secretary of State Adece that he had received a dispatch from his government confirming the information previously received that in the treaty to be signed on October 8, provision would be made for the opening two ports in Manchuria. The Chinese Minister, after his last conversation with Secretary Hay, informed his government that the United States would insist upon open ports in Manchuria, and he advised them to yield gracefully to the American demands.
