### Obituary.

Mrs. Amanda M. W. Mott, wife of Rev. A. B. Mott, died near Brockway, Ore., August 23, 1903. The deceased was born in Richmond, Township, Tioga Co., Pa., August 2, 1840. She had been a resident of Oregon since 1875. She gave her heart to God, and united with the M. E. Church in December 1872, and continued a consistent member of the same until death.

In the different places where her husband has preached, she endeared herself to the people among whom they labored.

The survivors of her family, husband, one son and three daughters, knew her love and fidelity best, and feel her loss most keenly; yet they believe in her case, "To die is gain."

The body was taken to Oakland, Ore., for interment, where sympathy and many floral offerings were presented by former neighbors and friends, and a short service conducted by Rev. James Conner, of Wilbur. J. C.
