The Roseburg Public School opened at nine o'clock this morning with an enrollment of 543 pupils, which is 117 more than were enrolled at the opening last year, an increase of about 20 per cent. The teachers and their respective grades are as follows:

First grade, Miss Stuart, Miss Aiken; second grade, Miss Beyers, Miss Thompson; third grade, Miss Kabat; third and fourth grades, Miss Stewart; fourth and fifth grades, Miss Aldrich; fifth grade, Miss Clark; sixth grade, Miss Cook; seventh grade, Miss Erickson; eighth grade, Miss Golder; high school, Miss Parrott, Mr. A. M. Sanders. The services of one, and probably two more teachers will be required soon.
