Another Crusade. A special dispatch from Chicago says: A 20th century crusade against their ancient enemy, the Turk, is being planned by the Knights Templar, with the Balkans, place of Palestine, as the field in which they will protect Christians against the oppression of the infidels. Prominent members of the order are agitating the formation of a league that will send regiments of well drilled fighters to the aid of Bulgaria, and the crusaders of the 12th century may have their prototype in a movement of the Knights Templar against the troops of the Porte.

The plan has received consideration by the Chicago members of the organization for some time, and tonight was formally broached at a meeting of St. Bernard commandery.
