German workmen take well to American machine-made shoes. In April, 1901, an American firm opened a retail store in Berlin to sell shoes in all sizes and all leathers at a uniform price of 18 marks (\$4.28). In nine months 26,600 pairs were sold. Branches were opened at Frankfort and Hamburg. In the three stores during the first six months of the present year 54,400 pairs were sold.

Figures compiled by the Department of Commerce and Labor through the Bureau of Statistics show that the imports of the United States in the past ten years have increased from \$866,000,000 to \$1,025,000,000 and exports from \$847,500,000 to \$1,420,000,000.
