



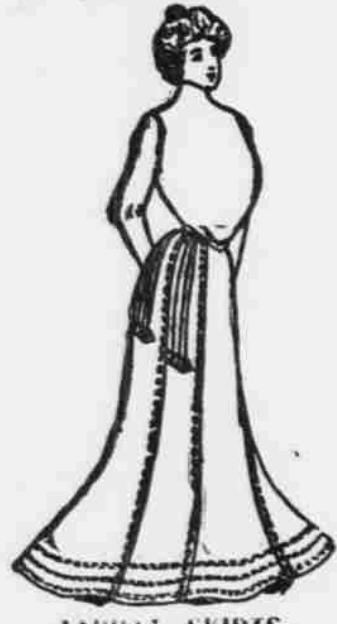

A special from Medford says: The apple picking season is about closed. Many of the orchard men have gathered more apples than they estimated and very few have fallen below. The fruit is first class as to coloring and size, and the quality is fully up to the average. Stevens & Brushback, who have an orchard in the foothills 25 miles east from Medford, which has been regarded rather as an experiment, estimated their yield at 2500 boxes; but packed 4000. The apples are the finest ever sent out from Medford, being mostly three and a half tier, and some four tier, but no four and a half. Their Newtons go direct to London, through Ray & Hatfield, of New York. The Spitzbergs go to Newhall & Son, of Chicago. J. A. Whitman will pack 1000 boxes more than his estimate called for, and the increase goes right along the line.
