Steel Rail Lines in Oregon.
Bridges of the Southern Pacific Company on the line between Portland and San Francisco are being thoroughly overhauled. Wooden structures are being replaced with modern steel bridges and the smaller culverts, where wooden bridges formerly crossed, are being filled with earth and rock. The cost of these improvements is very heavy.
John D. Isaacs and party, head of the bridge engineering department of the Southern Pacific are in Portland on an inspection trip north from San Francisco. Mr. Isaacs has inspected all the bridges on the line in the course of reconstruction, and states that the company's bridges will soon equal the best.
"Steel is the only stuff which can be used these modern days," said Mr. Isaacs, "and the Southern Pacific is putting in the best that can be had."
The line is also laying new 90 pound rails on the road between Portland and San Francisco. The light rails have been replaced almost wholly in California, and the work will go on in Oregon. Part of the road has already been rechecked.

In the mountains, where the strain of travel is great, it is necessary to have the best of roadbed, and the curves demand strong rails. Oregon has considerable of this roadbed, especially in the Siskiyou mountains and Cow Creek canyon.
Although construction gangs and other workers are being laid off in the interest of economy, those laying heavy rails in place of the light ones are being kept at work, and will be retained until this improvement has been completed.—Telegram.
