The February Smart Set.

The February number of The Smart Set opens with a striking novelette, "The Wanderers," by Gertrude Lynch—a story with a wholly new theme, as strong as it is interesting. In "An Impossibility" Frank Saville has written a strong story of adventure, while Julia Hawthorne contributes a powerful study of the occult in "The Ghost of the Old Adam," and Seumas MacManis's "Lost by a Nose," is as humorous a piece of fiction as its author has ever written. Besides these there are charming stories of such well-known writers as J. J. Bell, Herbert D. Ward, Virginia Woodward Cloud, James Branch Cabell, Charles M. Skinner and Kate Masterson. Richard La Gallienne, that writer of beautiful prose, contributes one of his best essays, which he calls "Dear Dead Women," and Andre Sardou, a son of Victorien Sardou, is represented by a play in the original French, "L'Instinct."

The poetry in this number is above praise. Among the verse-writers are Edith M. Thomas, John Vance Cheney, Madison Cawein, Arthur Macy, Ethel M. Kelley, Liastie Woodworth Reiser, Theodosia Garrison, Arthur Streeter, Clifton Scollard and Eliza Barker.
