N. Drake of Dad & Crk Lost in the Mountains.

The terrible news was brought to town Tuesday night that A. N. Drake, who owns a farm on Dad's creek, about nine miles west of Glendale, had been lost in the mountains near his home for two days and nights.

On Monday morning he started out to hunt, telling his wife he would be absent until about noon. He took with him his rifle and a hatchet, saying he intended to cut some brush from the trail.

While dressing for the trip, he took from his pocket his tobacco and matches which he unfortunately forgot to take with him. He had about 20 rounds of ammunition.

Not having returned home by dusk his wife became alarmed and notified a neighbor, B. W. S. Folk, the goat raiser. Mr. Folk began a search at once for the missing man and every few minutes during the night he discharged his rifle from several different peaks in the mountains, but received no reply from the lost man.

On Wednesday the neighborhood was aroused and about 20 men began a systematic search through the mountains where Mr. Drake was supposed to be, a dozen or more men from Glendale joining in the hunt. Up to the hour of going to press, not the least trace of him has been found, and the heartbroken wife, is completely prostrated over the terrible affair.

A heavy snow fell in the mountains Sunday night and all day Monday, to the depth of nearly two feet, making it impossible to track the missing man. The supposition is that he accidentally shot himself, or perhaps fell over a bluff and died a horrible death in the lonely snow-covered mountains. In that event it is not likely the body will be found until the snow goes off, if at all.

Mr. Drake, who was a man of 35 years of age, came to this section last summer with his wife from Minnesota. He belonged to the Masonic and Odd Fellows orders and was a man of excellent character—Glendale News.
