It was with an air of gladness that the members of the Amalgamated Waiters made their way into Schubert Hall, at No. 12 St. Mark's place, last night, says a New York despatch. They had been expelled from membership in the Waiters' Alliance of America because they opened their meetings with prayer.

Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, when he learned the facts ordered the Waiters' Alliance to restore the devout members into good standing in the union.

After a warm debate last night the Alliance obeyed the order, but put a stumbling block in the way by refusing to admit the ostracized ones unless they returned as individuals and paid an assessment fee.

The praying waiters unanimously rejected the proposition and President Gompers will again come forward as peace-maker. He is at present in Porto Rico.

Annual School Census.

County Superintendent F. B. Hamlin has sent out to the several district clerks the blanks for the annual school census. The census is required by law to be taken in the last week of February and shall include every person between the age of four and twenty years actually residing in the district on the 25th of February. The census reports are to be held by the district clerks until the annual meeting on the third Monday in June, which this year falls on the date of the 20th. They are then submitted to the board of directors for correction, and one copy filed in the district records and another forwarded to the County Superintendent with the annual report of the district.
