The Walking Ghost. Angelina B. Richardson, of this city, has filed in the circuit court here a suit for divorce from her husband, T. K. Richardson. The grounds in the complaint are many. The couple were married at East Portland, Nov. 28, 1889. Defendant is charged with cruel and inhuman treatment and neglect of regard for plaintiff. It is alleged that defendant left home in October, 1903, knowing Mrs. Richardson was sick, and went to Portland; while he was absent, her illness became critical and word was sent to Mr. Richardson to return home at once, which he failed and refused to do. Mrs. Richardson was alone and unable to care for herself and was wholly dependent on friends for food and care. It is claimed that Mr. Richardson has been absent for over ten days, in Portland, at different times, without cause or business; that the defendant has provided plaintiff with but little clothing since their marriage, while nearly all the clothing worn by her has been purchased with her own means; that he has refused to take her to church, public gatherings or other places of amusement, but left her at home, while he spent a greater portion of his time in company of women of doubtful reputation; that for the last several months the defendant has been absent from their home a great portion of the time, and that he has in his company, when absent, a young woman, ostensibly as clerk or business manager; that the conduct of Mr. Richardson and said woman and the relations which they are credited with bearing to each other has caused great scandal and caused plaintiff much shame and humiliation; that in order to procure money to be used for purposes of his own, Mr. Richardson has several times signed the name of Mrs. Richardson to promissory notes, without her consent or knowledge, and in order to save him from exposure, she has taken up and destroyed the notes; at the time of the marriage the plaintiff owned considerable real and personal property in her own right, but at present most of her property is mortgaged or encumbered in order to assist Mr. Richardson in his business ventures, and save him from exposure, by paying the forged notes. The plaintiff also asks for ten shares in the Improved Mineral Smelting Co.—par value of share, \$200 each—which it is alleged was purchased by Mr. Richardson with her money, and which it was agreed by them should be entered on the books of the company in her name, which agreement Mr. Richardson violated.

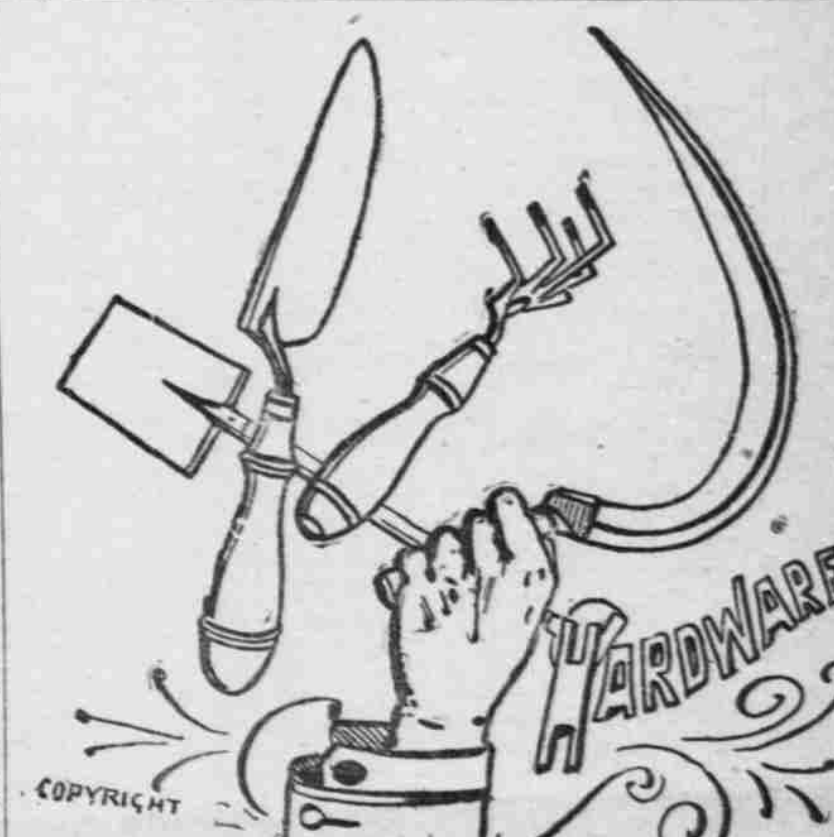
