#### CONGRESSIONAL AFFAIRS.

The Congressional convention for the First district assembles at Salem. on Wednesday morning. So far the two leading candidates are Hon. Binger Hermann, and Hon. L. T. Harris, of Eugene.

It can be stated positively by the Hermann adherents that they will have 115 delegates who are pledged, and that Mr. Harris has less than sixtv. If Mr. Harris allows his name to go before the convention Mr. Hermann will be elected on the first ballot. There is danger in the Hermann overwhelming majority, and in the Harris weakness. So far two or three gentlemen who aspired to be dark horses bolted the ring when they saw how Harris, in the early part of the campaign, seemed to be sweeping everything before him, and later, when Hermann's forces rallied. and carried county after county and it became apparent that the Eugene boy orator had no chance, then the bolting racers wanted to get back on the track. If Harris declines to enter the race, then all the opposing factions to Hermann will, it is feared, break out, and old fends will be revamped. It is predicted that if Mr. Hermannn is not nominated on the first ballot there is possible danger of defeat, as Harris' supporters might join the ambitions of one man, who, if he carried his delegation, might make trouble, for it is conjectured that with sixty for Harris, seventeen for Brownell and a few others who have a leaning for other probable candidates might defeat the nomination. The original race, as it stood, was Harris against the field. Today the situation has changed, and it is Hermann against the field, the same as it was at the convention last year.




