MACHINE SHOP FOR ROSEBURG.

A First Class, Well Equipped Shop is Now Established Here.

Jas. Arrence, late of Pennsylvania, who arrived in this city in March of last year, is preparing to open a first class fully equipped machine shop in this city and is at present busy installing his machinery in the shop which is located on the Parks property on the corner of Kane and Washington streets opposite Wm. Carrolls residence. The old building has been enlarged and is now 20x50 feet, making ample room for the workshop.

Among the machines at present being erected are a six horse gasoline engine, a milling machine, one large 20 inch lathe and a small lathe, large drill press, hack saw machine, punch and cut machine, clipper grinder, buffer and buff wheels for all kind of polishing, enameling ovens for bicycle enameling, and several others.

It is Mr Arrence's intention to install, in the near future, a foundry that will be ample for any casting that will be needed in this section of the country. Mr. Arrence is a skilled workman and comes to this place with the best of recommendations. As this is an industry that has been needed in this section for a long time, let us all put our shoulders to the wheel and push it along.

RAYMOND—At his home on Days Creek, Douglas County, Oregon, Friday morning April 15, 1904, Mr. Ephraim Raymond, aged 80 years, after a two weeks illness of pneumonia.

Mr. Raymond was an old and respected pioneer resident of this county. A native of New York state he came to Canyonville, Oregon, in 1851, being a resident of that vicinity ever since. His wife and four children survive him.
