Maning Corn Oil.

Oil, which is said to be superior to lin seed oil for mixing paints, is now extracted from corn. Heretofore crude of has been obtained by pressure, but the latest method is to extract it by what is known as the solvent process. This is the method employed at the new cor cil mill at Decatur, Ill., the only one o its kind in the country.

The process from separating the o from the corn is simply in theory, bu somewhat complicated in its practical application. A solvent is used, the solvent being a light oil subject to evapora tion. The oil bearing portions of the corn are steeped in the solvent, which takes up the corn oil.
