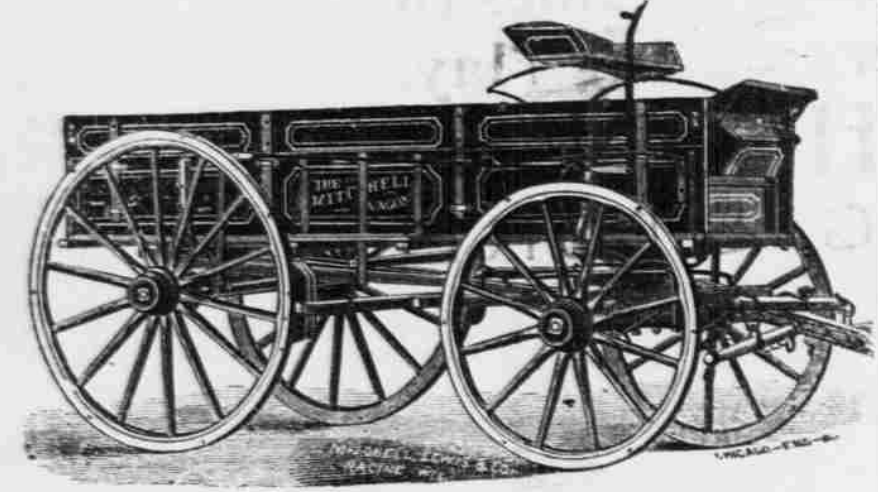

**Church Union After 96 Years.**  
Buffalo, N. Y., May 27.—The Presbyterian general assembly today voted in favor of union with the Cumberland church. The vote was followed by a demonstration. When ratification of this action is made by Presbyterian synods there will be no north, no south, in Presbyterianism. The vote was overwhelming in favor of amalgamation. It was preceded by lively discussion. The negro delegates opposed the proposition. By this action the question of infant damnation on which the parent church and its offshoot, the Cumberland church, went asunder in 1810 disappears.

"This action on the part of the Presbyterian general assembly in Buffalo means that the United Presbyterian church will have a membership of 1,500,000," said Rev. E. Nelson Allen, of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, of this city, when told to the Journal's telegram telling of the act of the general assembly.  
"It will be glad tidings to all Presbyterians. It means an increase of strength to the church, and complete accord on all matters."  
"While the act of the general assembly of today will have to be referred to the presbyteries for confirmation, and will have to be again referred to the general assemblies of the two bodies next year, there is scarcely a doubt but that the union will go through."  
"In Tennessee on February 4, 1810, a few Presbyterian ministers who could no longer support the third chapter of the Westminster confession—that part which deals with infant damnation—organized the Cumberland Presbyterian church. Since then the Cumberland church has slowly but steadily grown until now it has a membership of 300,000, divided among 118 presbyteries. For the most part the members of the Cumberland church are confined to the south, to the central and the middle states, and remotely in the west."  
"Last year, at Los Angeles, the Presbyterian general assembly did exactly with the third chapter of the confession as our leaders had done in 1810. Immediately, our people made overtures for a union of the two churches. It was these overtures that were approved by our assembly in Dallas and by the assembly in Buffalo today."—Portland Journal.

Will you vote to give the people a chance to protect their homes from the greatest enemy of civilization or will you help the enemy? Those who will do all in their power to help you in making good citizens of your children are working, hoping and praying for the bill. If you want to help them put a cross between 300 and yet under "For Local Option Liquor Law" and get as many others to do the same as you can.
