### W. C. T. U. CONVENTION.

White Ribboners in Session With a Good Attendance and Interesting Program.

The Ninth Annual Convention of the Douglas County W. C. T. U. met at the M. E. church Wednesday evening June 22nd.

Rev. Allen, of the Methodist church, south, led the devotions reading Eph. 6. and advocating putting on the whole armor of God as the best preparation for temperance work.

The choir rendered some excellent music and in behalf of the city, Mr. Louis Larzee made an address. He gave the convention a hearty welcome, paid women the highest compliment possible, and after some encouraging words closed by handing the County President, as he said, the keys to all business houses of the city, including the banks, the keys to the jail, his residence, and to his law office, about forty in all. Mrs. Bailey of Prohibition Park, N. Y., national lecturer of the W. C. T. U., who has been in convention work many years, said it was the most unique idea she ever heard.

Rev. Ritchey of the Christian church, welcomed the organization in the name of the churches of the city, tendering all the aid they were able to give and encouraging the workers with his earnest helpful thoughts.

Mrs. H. K. Ferguson gave in behalf of the Roseburg Union a heartfelt welcome. One listening to her could but be glad to be numbered with such a band of workers.

Mrs. Bishop, of Yoncalla, responded to their welcome speeches, being thankful for their words of good cheer, and asking the continued co-operation of the good people of Roseburg in putting down the great evil, intemperance.

The choir sang the W. C. T. U. Rally Song composed by Mrs. L. E. Bailey after which Mrs. Bailey recited an original poem and told of the necessity of taking a collection but because of the small audience the receipts were not enough to "fricasse the asparagus."

Rev. Ritchey pronounced the benediction.

The convention will conclude its work Friday, the program closing Friday evening with an interesting gold medal contest at the M. E. church, there being seven contestants for the prize and honors. These meetings, especially the evening sessions should be largely attended as they are very interesting and instructive.

Obituary.

John Charles Loddington, oldest son of Rev. Charles and Emma Loddington, was born in Denver, Colorado, April 27th, 1882. He died at his home nine miles east of Myrtle Creek, June 17th, 1904 at the age of 22 years, 1 month and 21 days.

He came with his parents to Myrtle Creek, Oregon in 1885 at which place he has resided since that time. He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at the age of 14 years. He was a very industrious young man, a genial companion, and universally esteemed by those who knew him. Five weeks before his death he contracted typhoid fever which was later complicated with pneumonia, from which he was unable to rally.

Funeral services were conducted at Myrtle Creek on Saturday, June 18th, Rev. L. C. Zimmerman officiating.

Perry Ellis Jackson, was born in Webster Co. Mo., April 5 1880 and departed this life June 16 1904, at the age of 24 yrs. 2mo. 11 da.

His father moved to Denton, Denton Co. Tex., in 1890. Here his father died in 1891. His mother with her family then moved to Glenn Ind. Ter. from whence they moved to Oregon in 1896. He joined the L. O. O. F. Lodge at Riddle about two years ago and the Masonic Lodge at Canyonville about one year ago.

He said to his mother and brothers a few days before he died, "I am ready to die and want to go where there is rest." The night before he died he told them, "I wish I could die to-night and meet my Lord, but I guess my time has not come yet, but He will come and get me and I will be where there is neither pain nor suffering." He was conscious until he passed away.

He leaves a mother and four brothers, three here and one in Glenn, Ind. Ter. His father is buried in the city cemetery at Denton, Tex., one brother in Springer Ind. Ter., one in Napa, Cal., and one in Riddle.

Funeral services were conducted at the Baptist church at Riddle by Rev. L. C. Zimmerman, of Canyonville.

A Simple Refrigerator.

W. O. Hemlow, a practical fish canner, sealing, packing, condensed milk, and fruit evaporator man of Astoria, was in this city this week on his way from Coos Bay to Astoria. While here, he, with others, were talking of cheap means of keeping fresh meat, butter and milk cool during the summer months, and to demonstrate that a practical refrigerator could be erected and operated without cost he built one at the shop of Mr. Benedict and convinced the onlookers that it is foolish to spend money for ice during the hot season.

Following is a description of Mr. Hemlow's iceless refrigerator: Build a wooden frame the size you wish your refrigerator, making brackets for shelves, then cover the frame with ordinary burp, making two top double thickness. The side to be used for a door can be left open on one side or a swinging frame door covered with burp may be used. Then take an ordinary oil can and punch a hole in each side near the bottom of the can and insert wooden plugs so that the dripping of the water may be regulated, then fill the can with water, place it on top of the covered frame, regulate the flow of the water and your refrigerator is complete. The model which Mr. Hemlow built was placed in the sun and started working and a plate of soft hard placed on the shelf. Within an hour the hard was solid and hard as if it had been kept on ice for a month. This is a simple arrangement which any one can build with little expense. Try it.
