Wagon Turned Over.

Wm. Allen while hauling wood for George Kohlihan from the hill back of the Fair Grounds Saturday met with an accident which came near costing him his life. He had started down the steep incline with his load of wood when the break proved inadequate, and in shifting about to check the speed of the wagon a small stump was encountered which turned the wagon over, Mr. Allen being thrown to the ground violently on his head and shoulders sustained several severe bruises as well as two broken ribs. He was brought to town in an unconscious condition for medical treatment and soon rallied, but will be confined to his home for some time as a result of his injuries. Lovell In Trouble Again.

Harry Lovell, a printer, who is well known in this city, and who for some time past has held a position in the Portland restaurant, recently betrayed the confidence reposed in him by a Douglas County friend, regarding which the Portland Journal says: "Harry Lovell is charged with the larceny of \$40, intrusted to his care by J. L. Shambrook, a wealthy rancher of southern Oregon."

Shambrook makes frequent trips to this city and always went to the Portland restaurant, because Lovell, his brother's friend, was a waiter there. Three days ago he went there and after luncheon, gave Lovell \$40 to keep for him. Lovell left the place, taking the money, it is charged.

Detective Hawley was assigned on the case, and traced Lovell to a lodging house at 105 North Thirteenth street. The landlord there informed the officer that Lovell departed, leaving behind a small bill.

Information came to Detective Hawley that Lovell was in Castle Rock, Wash., and a warrant was telegraphed there, but he could not be found." Lovell was a member of the Second Oregon and went through the Philippine campaign being seriously wounded. It was during this time that he formed the acquaintance of Sargent D. R. Shambrook, mentioned above.
