DEATH OF "PROF." NOURSE.

An Eccentric Old Soldier Who Boasted of a Musical "Trill."

SALEM, Or., July 14.—"Professor" Frederick Augustus Nourse, a civil war veteran of the Army of the Potomac, and a unique yet well-known character of Salem for many years, passed away at the insane asylum yesterday, aged 64 years. He was noted for his self-esteemed ability to "trill," upon which vocal feat he claimed patent right. He claimed to be champion of the world in this wonderful mode of splitting the air with discordant sound, and expected to make a fortune out of it. He was caught in a criminal forgery at Roseburg a couple of years ago, and this led to his incarceration, as it was believed that insanity only drove him to the act. He was wounded in the head in one of the battles of the civil war and this affected his mind.

OREGON PRUNE CROP.

This Year's Yield Estimated at Six Million Pounds. Third of Average Output.

SALEM, Or., July 16.—Notwithstanding the poor yield of prunes this season, the officers of the Willamette Valley Prune Association believe there is no occasion for anyone to be discouraged. In some parts of Western Oregon, a few growers have begun digging up their trees, but these seem to be exceptional cases. There are some orchards so located that the crops are poor offshoots than good. On the other hand, there are many orchards that yield well even in poor seasons. In the Roseburg country, south of Salem, a profitable crop of prunes is gathered every year.

Prunes are now nearly full-grown and though estimates of the yield this year are largely guesswork, some idea can be gathered as to the condition of the crop. The Willamette Valley Prune Association has received reports of conditions from every portion of Western Oregon and from these it is estimated that the yield will be 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 pounds of cured fruit. Manager H. S. Gile thinks 6,000,000 pounds is the highest estimate that could be made and this would be about one-third of an average crop and one-fifth of last year's crop. The prune crop seems to be best in the Salem and Dallas districts and poorest from Albany south to the Rogue River country. An average yield in the district on the east side of the Willamette from Portland to the Santiam River is about 6,000,000 pounds and the yield this year is estimated at 2,500,000 pounds. On the west side from Portland to Corvallis the normal yield is 4,000,000 pound, but it will reach no more than half that this year. In the district extending from the Santiam to Creswell, Lane County, an average yield of 3,000,000 pounds will be cut to 500,000 this year. An average yield of 5,000,000 pounds in the region south of Yoncalla and including the Rogue River district, will be reduced this year to 1,000,000 pounds.

The estimated yield in Oregon this year, 6,000,000 pounds, is about half that of the year 1902, when the crop was short. Experiments are being made with packages put up in one or two-pound prunes and the indications are that fruit packed in this way will not sugar or lose much of its color or flavor.

Mr. Gile has recently received letters from prominent wholesale dealers in the East, who have tried Oregon prunes upon their own tables, cooking them according to directions. These men, who had heretofore known Oregon prunes only as they saw them in the bag or box, say that the fruit feels anything in the shape of a prune they have ever eaten before. Letters of this kind encourage Mr. Gile to believe that the Oregon prune can be advertised and made known as a superior article in the cured fruit market.

Oregon Development League.

The Portland Commercial Club has issued a call for a convention of the Oregon Development League, to be held at the Marquam Grand Theater in Portland, August 2nd and 3rd. All commercial, agricultural, mining, stockraising and irrigation interests will be represented; every editor in the state will be invited to attend as a delegate; County Commissioners and Mayors of all towns and cities will also be called upon to name delegates, the Portland Woman's Club will look after the comfort of ladies accompanying delegates, and, among other entertainments, have arranged for a trolley ride on August 2nd, taking in the most interesting and beautiful environs of Portland, and on August 3rd ten street cars will be provided for a trip over the entire city.

The Southern Pacific Company will sell tickets at a very low rate of one fare for the round trip, from all points on Oregon Lines to Portland and return for the occasion, and it is hoped that every section of the state will be well represented at the convention, to work in harmony for the development of Oregon.
