McGilvray, of Cottage Grove, passed through Roseburg Friday evening on his way to Grave Creek, Josephine county, to succeed Jacob Steiner, Postal Telegraph lineman, who committed suicide at that place Wednesday morning of last week by shooting himself with a 45-75 Winchester. Steiner, who was aged 40 years, has recently been sick and it is believed that it was in a fit of temporary depression that he committed the act of self destruction.

The unfortunate man got up from his sick bed in the absence of his nurse and secured the rifle with which he shot himself. Steiner has been employed as a lineman by the Postal company at Grave Creek and Wolf Creek for 15 years past. He leaves a wife and four children, the eldest being 12 and the youngest four years of age.
