Roosevelt and the Russian Cruiser

OYSTER BAY, Sept. 13.-Russia's auxiliary cruiser Lena, which put into the 24 00 port of San Francisco last Sunday, 196 90 presumably from Vladivostok, either 81 25 will have to leave that port within a 9 55 brief time prescribed by this Government or will have to dismantle. That, 32 00 in brief, it can be stated authoritatively 581 80 is the decision of President Roosevelt. REPAIRS ARE NEEDED.

Rear-Admiral Goodrich, Commander 24 15 in-Chief of the Pacific fleet, stated that 32 70 he had made an inspection yesterday of 37 25 the Russian ship Lena, and that she was genuinely in need of repairs.

Admiral Goodrick's report shows that 88 10 to make temporary repairs to the boilers and machinery of the Lena, according 9 00 to the naval expert's opinion would require six weeks' time. The captain of the vessel claims that it needs new II 00 boilers, and if the request to be ailowed to put these in as arranged, no 8 25 less than eight months' time will be required to make the change.
