### SUICIDED BY HANGING

Miss Lillian Farrer Takes Her Life in a Fit of Despondency  
MANY FRIENDS SHOCKED  
Body Found Dangling at the End of a Rope Fastened to the Limb of Pear Tree

Ill, despondent and weary of life, Miss Lillian Farrer, the beautiful and accomplished twenty-year-old daughter of F. H. Farrer, superintendent of the Roseburg Water, Light and Power Company, brought her sufferings and troubles to a tragic end Wednesday evening by hanging herself in a large pear tree back of the family home, in North Roseburg.  
Owing to her gentle and winsome disposition and kindly nature despite her ill health, she was held in the highest esteem by all who know her, and her friends were many in this city, therefore the news of her untimely and tragic death was a severe shock to the entire community over which it has cast a gloom of sadness.  
For some time past she has been engaged in stenography work at intervals in local offices, and on the eve of her death she called on a young lady friend in North Roseburg. Returning home soon after night-fall she informed members of her family that she had received an invitation to stay over night with this young lady friend, whose parents are neighbors of the Farrer family, and then took her departure, which was the last she was seen by anyone until her lifeless body was discovered by her younger sister after daybreak this morning, dangling at the end of a rope attached to a limb of a large pear tree which stands in the doorway of the family home, her feet being but a few inches above the ground.  
It appears that upon leaving the room she secured a part of the cotton clothes-line and climbing upon a carpenter's trestle or horse, fastened one end of the rope securely to a limb of the pear tree then forming a slip knot placed the loop over her head, secured it about her neck then stepped from the trestle, a horrible death resulting soon thereafter from strangulation. An examination of the body on the following morning indicated that life had been extinct for some hours, hence it is probably that the rash act was committed soon after she left the house on Wednesday evening.  
Miss Farrer was born at Orwell, Penn., Dec. 17, 1883, and some years ago was sun-stroke which ever afterward left her in a debilitated condition, her eyes frequently causing her much trouble as a result. This trouble owing to her very ambitious nature, caused her to become despondent a time and it is thought that in a fit of temporary insanity she was prompted to take her life. She leaves a father, stepmother, sister, and a brother besides many friends to mourn their loss. Funeral services will be held from the family home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Townsend, interment in the Masonic cemetery.

**CORONER'S VERDICT.**  
Dr. J. C. Twitchell empaneled a jury to inquire into the cause of the young lady's death at 1 o'clock today and the following verdict was rendered:  
ROSEBURG, Or. Nov. 3, '04.  
We, the persons empaneled as coroner's jury in the matter of the death of Lillian Farrer of Roseburg, Oregon, do find by the evidence presented to the jury, that Lillian Farrer hanged herself to the limb of a pear tree at the rear of her father's residence in North Roseburg during the early part of the evening of Nov. 2, 1904, during a period of temporary insanity.
