Mme. The result was a five-year contract at an enormous salary for the Carra company at the Metropolitan Opera house, New York. At the conclusion of her New York contract, Mme. Mantelli made a tour of the principal cities of Europe with Sig. Tamango, winning fresh laurels in Paris, Berlin, Vienna, St. Petersburg, and elsewhere. Three years ago she returned to Lisbon to sing at the San Carlos, where she had won her first laurels when but a mere girl. Her triumph in "Carmen" and other opera was enormous. On this occasion she was decorated by the King of Portugal. Mme. Mantelli is not only a great singer—she is a most charming and cultivated young woman, speaking almost as easily as her native Italian, four other languages, French, German, English and Spanish, and singing her roles in them all.
