Things Doing at "The Grove"

Last Friday G. B. Hengen, of New York, president of the Cottage Grove, Bohemia railroad, and Oregon Securities Mining Co. of Bohemia, offered Mrs. Kate Perkins \$13,000 for her farm located in the suburbs of Cottage Grove, which is at the rate of \$100 per acre. The deal is being held up, the party requiring a little more for the place than was offered, but Mr. Hengen is also inspecting a 230-acre tract in the same vicinity which is offered to him for \$100 per acre by J. L. Jones, the tract being the best suited to Mr. Hengen's purpose will no doubt be purchased by him.

There is much speculation regarding the significance of this contemplated purchase, one story being to the effect that the S. P. Railroad Co. desires to purchase the Bohemia Railroad yards at Cottage Grove in order to transfer its freight division from Junction to that place which would necessitate Mr. Hengen securing yards elsewhere for his depot, round house, machine shops, etc. It is also stated that Mr. Hengen has some large manufacturing plants also in contemplation. He is also said to be negotiating for the big Long & Bingham saw mill at Cottage Grove, and that he will extend the railroad into Bohemia this season and will operate his company's mines on a large scale, the present prospects being very encouraging at the mines.

High School LAD

To Attend Inaugural Ceremonies of President Roosevelt in Washington, D. C.

Because of the short time in which the matter must be decided, there has been no very marked interest taken in the contest to send a student of the Roseburg high school to participate in the ceremonies of the inauguration of President Roosevelt. However, some effort is being made to arouse sufficient interest to raise the necessary funds to bear the expense of the trip. Some time since President Roosevelt extended an invitation for each high school in the United States to select someone of their number to come to Washington and participate in the inaugural. So far as known here no school in the state, except Portland, will send a representative, and it would be a stroke of good policy if Roseburg should send a young man from the high school for this purpose. It can be done, all right, but it behooves everyone who feels any interest in the matter to get up and hustle, for this time is so short that the contest in the city will close next Saturday. Voting coupons have been provided for the occasion and these are on sale at a number of places in town at five cents each, and at the close of the contest, which is a friendly one, the lad receiving the highest number of votes will be provided with the funds created by the sale of ballots for the purpose of paying his railroad fare and expenses. Boxes for the reception of ballots are provided at the postoffice and at the drug store of Fullerton & Richardson, and the ballots are counted every day by a committee composed of Misses Kabat, Byers and Smith. Several candidates are already in the field and others can enter at any time. Every man in town should buy some votes, as many as he feels able, and cast them for some one of the candidates and thereby help the thing along. It does not matter so much if your particular favorite is not successful, as it will be sufficient satisfaction that some Roseburg boy enjoys the distinction of having been sent to Washington for the purpose of the enterprise, which will be creditable to the town. Get in and do something to help the thing along.
