SEA FOAM RUNS DOWN SCHOONER

Marshfield Or., April 22.—The steam schooner Sea Foam has started on her sea career with a wreck to her credit on the first day she poked her bows in salt water. Yesterday morning she put out of the Columbia river on her maiden voyage with a load of lumber, and last night, during a dense fog, seven miles off Coquille Bay, she ran down the sailing schooner Del Norte. A few minutes afterwards that vessel was bottom up and a derelict on the ocean.

The Sea Foam was recently launched at Gray's Harbor, and was added to the fleet of A. W. Beadle & Co. She was towed to Portland, where her machinery was installed and her cargo of lumber was put on. She was on the way to San Francisco with it, but about noon today she put into Coos Bay with her bows smashed and the crew of the Del Norte on her decks. The Del Norte was owned by R. D. Hume of Curry county. Her cargo was slight loss.
