C. H. BRUCE THE BOSS ANGLER

Probably the largest fish ever caught with a hook and line in this state was landed at Winchester Friday by passenger brakeman, Chas. H. Bruce. It was a Royal Chinook Salmon measuring four feet and one inch in length and weighing 55 pounds. It was 2 m to the last and required no little strategy and skill to land it. During the same day Mr. Bruce landed two other fine salmon at this favorite fishing resort on the North Umpqua river 5 miles north of Roseburg, one weighing 24 and the other 31 pounds. The big fish was placed on exhibition in cold storage at Frank Kennedy's saloon Friday evening and attracted no little attention. Mr. Bruce is easily the boss angler up to date in this vicinity, and his is the prize big fish story of the season—but it is a true story with all fictitious embellishments omitted.
