### Nearing the Century Mile Stone

The frosts of many winters have whitened the locks, and the weight of four score and ten years have bent the form of our esteemed and venerable townsman, George W. Bennett. However, the sunshine and gladness of ninety summers have left their impress upon him, which still beams forth in his ruddy, pleasant face and is revealed in his pleasing address and genial manners. Today Mr. Bennett is celebrating his 90th birthday at his comfortable cottage home in Roseburg. He is enjoying good health and is decidedly well preserved for one who is nearing the century mile stone. He still takes delight in looking after and beautifying his little home and with the exception of failing eyesight he is little inconvenienced in getting about his premises and the streets of Roseburg.

He was born in Massachusetts on May 4, 1815. In early boyhood he went to Ohio to reside, where he remained several years, coming to this county and state about ten years ago.

Mr. Bennett was 4 years old when Queen Victoria was born; 9 when the first steamer crossed the Atlantic; 17 when George Stephenson built his first successful locomotive; 13 when Prof. Morse first conceived telegraphy; 32 when the first telegraph line was stretched, the very year in which Thos. Edison was born. J. J. Hill was not born until Mr. Bennett was 12 years old and Abraham Lincoln was a lad of 6 when Mr. Bennett first saw the light. The world which our venerable townsman entered was, in many things, vastly different from the one in which he now lives. May he round the century milestone.

### County Court in Session

The regular May term of the county court opened in Roseburg, Wednesday morning with County Judge M. D. Thompson and Commissioners A. E. Nichols, of Azalea, and J. C. Young, of Oakland, in attendance. Examination of bills and petitions occupied the time of the court during Wednesday. During the afternoon arguments pro and con were heard on the petition of residents of West Roseburg, asking for permission to incorporate as an independent town. The petition bears 48 signatures. Its principal purpose is alleged to be the defeat of one of the objects of the new charter, which goes into effect on the 1st of this month, and which provides for the extension of the city limits of Roseburg proper to include a greater part of the territory of what is familiarly known as West Roseburg. Arguments closed on that case this afternoon and the court announced a continuance of the case until next Saturday. Hon. J. C. Fullerton is representing the West side people and Attorney C. S. Jackson and J. T. Long the city of Roseburg.
