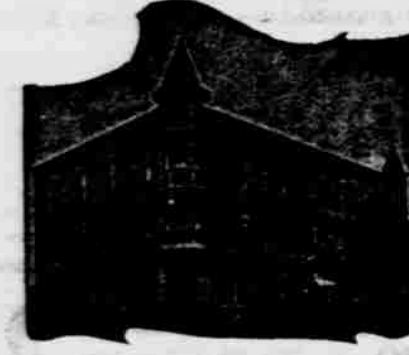

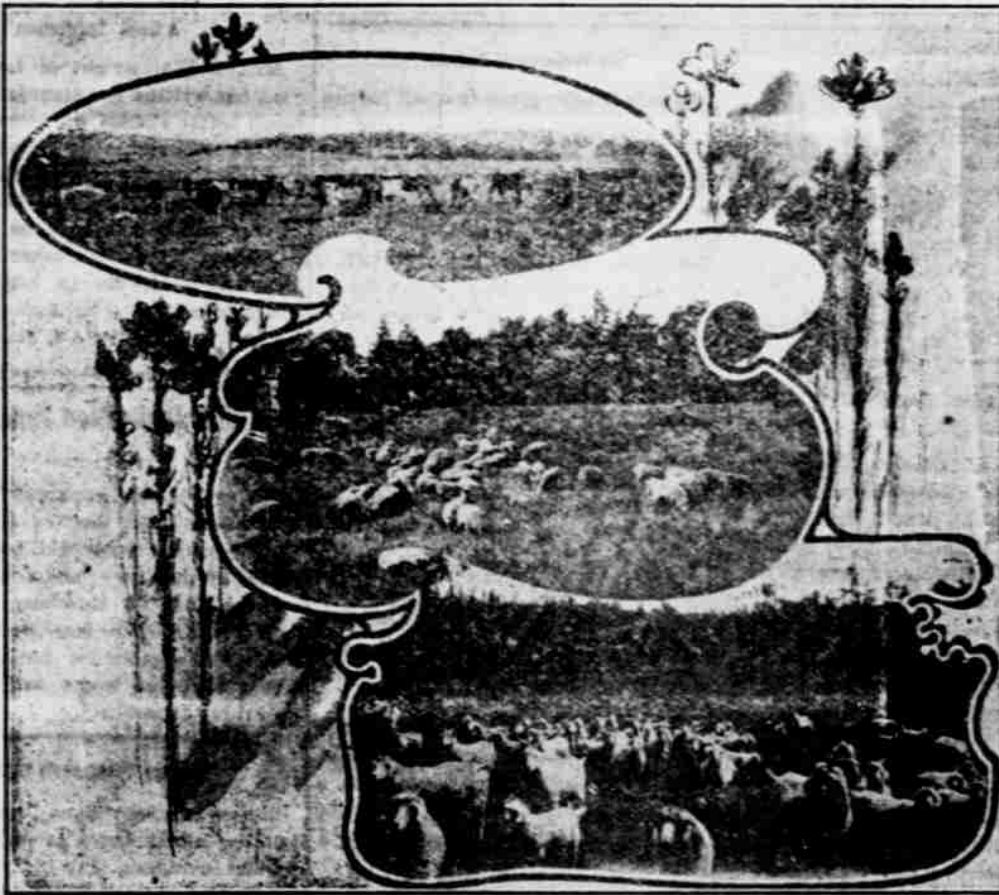

THE SLAYER OF DUNLAP

Grant's Pass, Ore., May 10.—Statements in the way of a confession were made by Dodson, implicating him with other mysterious crimes that have been committed in this county during the past two years, among them being a stage holdup, several highway robberies, and one or two "strange disappearances."

Andrew Dodson, haunted day and night by his crime and confronted by the statement that the murder of William Dunlap had been witnessed by young Lloyd Inman, has broken down and confessed. He makes practically a clean breast of the whole affair, and acknowledges that it was he who fired the shot that killed the old miner, on a September day in 1903. Dodson says he is suffering so keenly in conscience that he believes it better to tell the truth, and go by the shortest route to the gallows, preferring death to his present torment or to life imprisonment.

NAN PATTERSON GRANTED FREEDOM

New York, May 12.—Nan Patterson, the chorus girl, who was twice tried for the murder of Caesar Young, a case that has attracted the attention of the world, was removed from the Tombs this morning on her own recognizance. This means that the actress will never be brought to trial again on the charge of killing Caesar Young.

Nan was taken before Recorder Goff shortly after eleven o'clock, where District Attorney Jerome made the motion in which she was set free. She was accompanied by her counsel, Abe Levy, Daniel O'Reilly and her father. As soon as she heard the words which set her free Nan started for Levy's office. Tomorrow she will start for Washington to see her mother.

Judge Admonishes Showgirl.

"The District Attorney has seen fit to recommend your discharge. I fully coincide with him, and believe that the interests of justice will be fully subserved by granting this motion. There have been two trials, and in each of them the jury failed to agree. These two trials must have been terrible ordeals to you. "There is nothing I can add to this case that has not already been said, but let me entreat you in all your future life to remember the terrible experience I feel sure that you will do so, that you will remember your ordeal." Miss Patterson broke down and wept while the Judge was speaking.

Matthews Removed

President Roosevelt last Saturday removed from office United States Marshal W. F. Matthews at Portland, Oregon, and named in his place Charles J. Reed, of Portland. The reason given is that Mr. Matthews is out of harmony with the officials in charge of the land fraud prosecution in Oregon. District Attorney F. J. Henney, of Oregon, recommended that Matthews be removed. It is understood Henney also strongly endorsed C. J. Reed for the place to which he was later appointed.

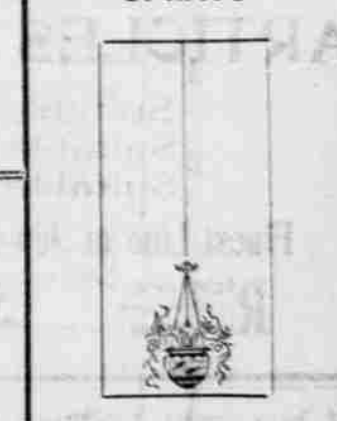
