THE BRANTON MURDER CASE

Eugene, June 20.—This afternoon at 2:40 o'clock the John Branton case was brought up in the circuit court. The demurrer which was filed yesterday by Branton's attorneys was heard by Judge Hamilton, who came from Roseburg this afternoon especially to try this case. The demurrer was overruled and Branton entered a plea of not guilty. The work of securing the jury was then commenced.

Branton Case On. The taking of testimony in the case of the state vs John Branton, charged with attempting to murder John Fletcher, has occupied the attention of the circuit court today. LEWIS AND CLARK CENTENNIAL NEWS

The attendance at the Lewis and Clark exposition is increasing daily. Excursions are run every day from one or more cities in the northwest, bringing many people to the fair.

Everybody who has visited the Lewis and Clark exposition pronounce the Trail "the best ever." There are thirty shows, and you can see them all for about 47. The prices range from 10 to 50 cents.

Twenty-five thousand people are expected to hit the Trail at the Portland fair on Sunday, June 24. That is to be Trail Day, with a big parade, speeches, special music and fireworks.

The National Good Roads convention opens in Portland June 21. Thousands of delegates from all over the United States, many with their families, are attending the convention and taking in the big fair.

The price of admission to the Lewis and Clark Exposition on Sundays has been reduced to 25 cents. The weekly admission remains at 50 cents. On Sundays the gates open at noon and close at 11:30 p. m.

The marvelous Baume, a team of high wire bicycle and trapeze performers, have been engaged to give two performances daily at the Lewis and Clark Fair from June 12 to July 3. The performances will be given in the open air and will be free to all.

July 12 will be Advertising Men's Day at the fair. The Pacific Coast Advertising Men's Association will be in session on that date. This association is working along very broad lines for the promotion of the coast and its products and for the elevation of advertising and the betterment of the craft.

Kiraly's great spectacle, "The Carnival of Venice," on the Trail, opened last week. Bolosy Kiraly has been known the world over for many years as a successful creator of brilliant spectacular exhibitions, and this time he has surpassed himself. There are nearly 300 people in the performance, including scores of pretty girls. Performances are given every afternoon and evening.

Towns and cities of the state of Washington will begin their special days at the Portland fair next week. June 27 will be Oklahoma day, and Governor Ferguson of that territory, with many citizens, will be in attendance. June 29 is Women's day, and July 1 is Tacoma day. The Dominion of Canada also will have special excursions on that day. The American Library Association convention begins its sessions Monday, July 3. On the 4th of July there will be a grand celebration of Independence Day, with a great display of fireworks in the evening.

Contrary to the impression which appears to be held by some persons in inland towns, the exhibits palaces at the Lewis and Clark fair are open free to the public. The fifty-cent admission fee includes admission to every building on the Exposition grounds, except, of course, the shows on the Trail. Toilet arrangements are also free. The exhibit buildings are open from eight in the morning until seven in the evening, except on Sunday, when the exposition does not open until noon. The Trail attractions are closed on Sunday, but the exhibits may be viewed on that day as on other days, also evenings hereafter.

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REFERENDUM VOTE JUNE 4, 1906

Governor Chamberlain has issued a proclamation naming June 4, 1906 as the time for holding the election on the referendum to the voters of the state of the \$1,000,000 appropriation bill for which a petition of 6,312 names has been filed with the secretary of state at Salem. The proclamation is in accordance with the law governing the referendum and is signed also by Secretary of State Dunbar.

The petition held up the appropriations for the maintenance and improvement of the asylum for the insane, the penitentiary, the reform schools, the deaf-mute and blind schools, the state university, the agricultural college, the normal schools and the current expenses of the state government. If the voters desire they may prevent payment of all items which were provided for in the bill, and pending the decision of the election, the state will issue evidence of indebtedness to provide for the carrying on of the government.
