There has been added to the Southern Division of the Cascade Range and Ashland Forest Reserves, under the supervision of S. C. Bartrum, Forest Supervisor, a department of technical forestry, and Mr. A. E. Cohoon, of Washington, D. C., Forest Assistant, has been added to Mr. Bartrum's forestry force, and will assist in the technical and scientific work of these important reserves. The government considers the Cascade Range Forest Reserve one of the most important reserves in the United States, and Mr. Bartrum being one of the oldest and most efficient supervisors in the Forest Service Department has placed at his disposal one of the best trained assistants in the forestry department, in the person of Mr. A. E. Cohoon.

However the watch was recovered and will be returned to its owner. As a sequel to the case Marshal Jarvis arrested the mistress of the house where the robbery occurred and assigned her on a charge of selling liquor in a dry precinct to which charge she pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 by Judge Orcutt, which fine was paid.
