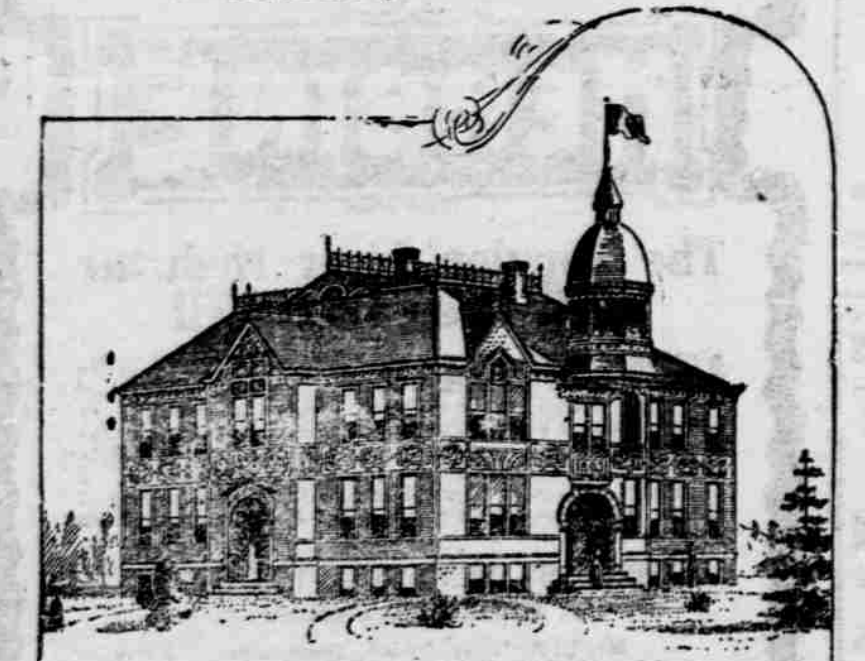

Mr. Conner is fifty years of age and has always been very active, and until a week before the stroke had no premonitory symptoms, and even then he paid no attention to them until the day of his affliction. County Court Orders.

County court for Douglas county was in session last week in Roseburg with Judge M. D. Thompson and Commissioners A. E. Nichols and J. C. Young in attendance. The following orders were made.

Edmond P. Drew, of Oakland, appointed county fruit inspector.

N. I. Nelson appointed fire ranger in the districts of Coon, Hinkle and Calapooia creeks.

Sept. 7, 1905, fixed as day for hearing petition for a road from Riddle to intersect the Canyonville-Myrtle Creek road, at the J. J. Chadwick place. Same date also set for taking action on the petition for a road from Rice Hill, through Red Hill to the W. W. Wilson place, near Yoncalla. The board of viewers has reported favorably on both roads and recommended that the petitions therefore be granted.

F. F. Patterson awarded contract for constructing cement sidewalk and gutter along the south side of the court house square, bordered by Douglas street, for \$225. Three other bids were submitted as follows: G. Worthington, \$210; M. W. Aldrich, \$203; Geo. Hawkins, \$240.

Dr. A. C. Seely appointed secretary of the Douglas County Board of Health.

Road in Riverside addition from West street to the Roseburg-Edenbower road ordered vacated and a parallel road ordered substituted one block north.

Plain Statement.

In an interview with a Plaindealer man today Mr. Blakeley said: There is great dissatisfaction with the water company because of the shortage in the supply of water and it is no more than just that the people should have the plain facts in this matter. Several weeks ago, as president of this company, we wrote the S. P. a request that they make some arrangements with us because of the warm season coming on. Up to the present time we have received no reply from them. At the conference above mentioned, we stated very frankly to the officials of the road that with the increasing traffic this year we would not be able to supply them with our present facilities and take care of the people of this town. They then said that they would either put in a pipe of their own or let us know in time so that we might purchase a new pipe. We realize that the S. P. Co. pay a large amount of money into this city each month, and of course are desirous of keeping their good will. In the meantime we do not feel as though this company should bear the burden of public opinion and be blamed for a shortage of water which we are trying to supply not only to the people but the railway as well. You may tell the citizens of Roseburg that we will immediately start our steam pumps and do our best to supply them with sufficient water for all purposes.

To be good iron rock; on each side there shall be placed large rock about 12 inches square and the balance between small rock; the whole width of iron rock shall be 11 feet wide and 12 inches thick; on the center of the iron rock shall be placed decomposed rock, 8 feet wide and 6 inches thick. Ditch—There shall be about four furrows plowed on the hillside of road bed, the dirt to be banked against the rock, forming a ditch about 1 1/2 feet wide and 8 inches deep at its top.
