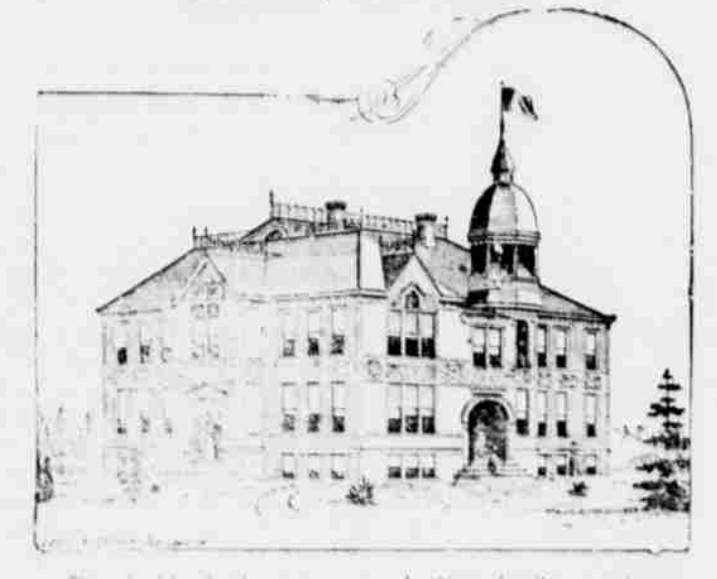

### RUNAWAY ACCIDENT

#### A DAMAGE SUIT

A buzz—a whirr—A clout of dust—A wild, blood-curdling yell—A ghastly object flashing by—Then silence—and a smell!

It is about all that can be said of the cause and effect of the lively runaway which occurred on Jackson street early Tuesday morning, the team being that of George Kohlhaugen which was composed of four of his best horses. The team was standing in front of Kohlhaugen's meat market when Fritz Stauffer rounded the corner of Cass and Jackson streets on his Rambler gasoline bicycle at which the four horse team took fright and becoming unmanageable dashed down Jackson street and ran to the Hermann residence where one horse fell, entangling and stopping the others. One horse was seriously skinned and bruised in consequence whereof Mr. Kohlhaugen has commenced suit against the owner of the motorcycle for \$250 damages. The suit will be watched with interest as it will be determined whether or not the payment of an annual state license of \$3.00 on an auto or motorcycle any rights or privileges on the public highway or city streets.

All auto and wheel men should use great caution to prevent scaring teams, but on the other hand the teams will have to get accustomed to them as they have the common bicycle, as the new machines have come to stay.

Word was received in Roseburg Tuesday from Sitkum, Brewster valley to the effect that Mrs. J. T. Bridges, of this city, sustained a painful injury to one of her knees while out riding Tuesday morning in a wagon with several other passengers. Walter Josephson, also of this city, was acting as driver. The wagon struck some obstruction in the road and the jar threw Mrs. Bridges out of her seat onto the ground. She fell in such a manner as to either dislocate or break one of her knees. Dr. George E. Honck was called and he returned to Roseburg Wednesday reporting that he found Mrs. Bridges suffering with a badly wrenched and sprained knee, but the member was not broken or dislocated. He placed the limb in a plaster cast and left her resting comparatively easy. She will remain at Brewster for probably ten days.

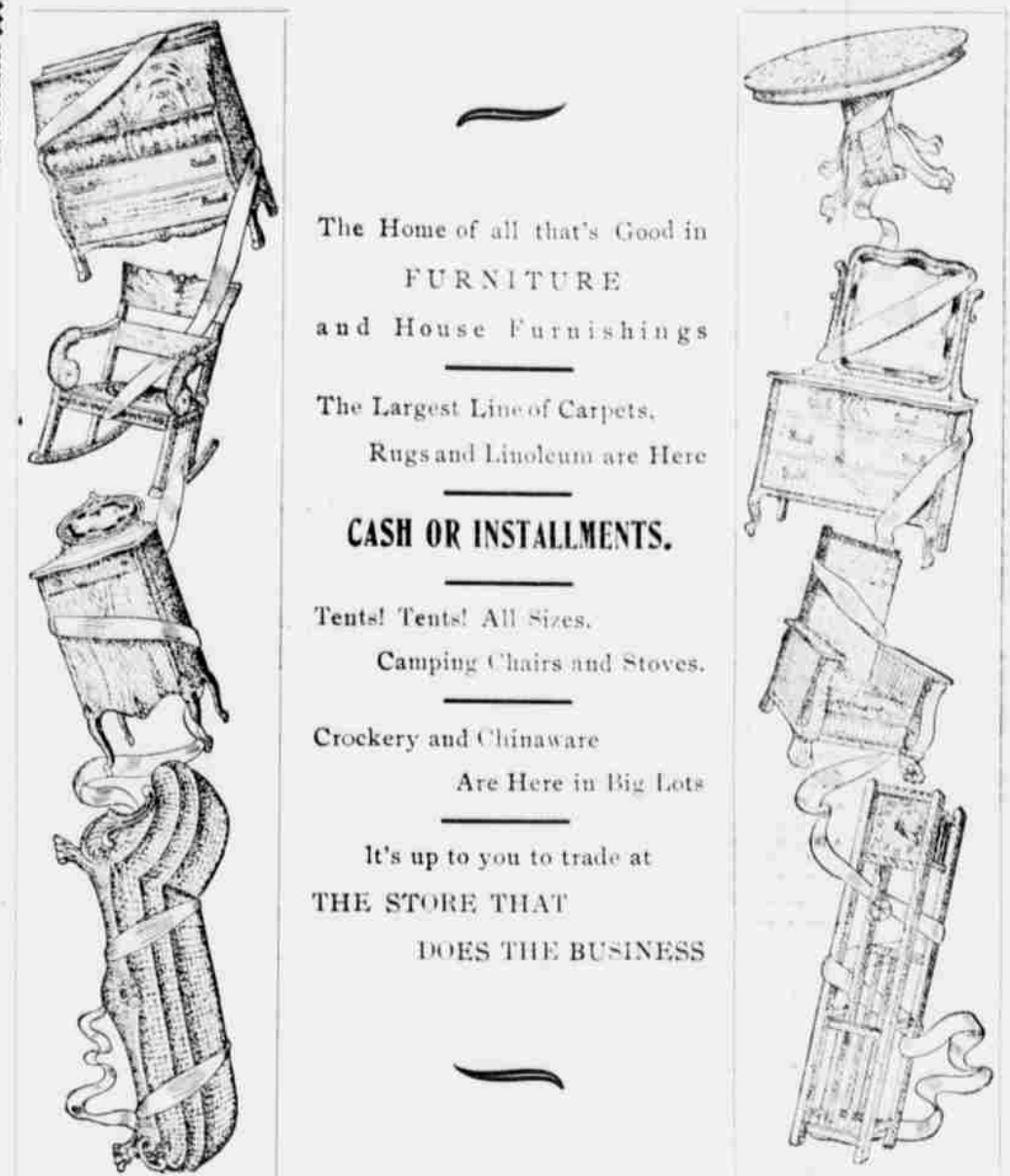
